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THE HAROLD BOX HALL AND DINGLEY VILLAGE LIBRARY ARE CHANGING – HAVE YOUR SAY

n January this year, Kingston Council approved Stage One of a planned redevelopment of the current Community facilities in the Marcus Rd reserve, comprising Dingley Village Library, Harold Box Hall and the Dingley Village Neighbourhood Centre.

A Master Plan has been developed for the site with works to be split into two stages. Stage One has been fully funded thanks to \$2.5million funding from Kingston Council and \$750,000 from the Victorian

Government's Living Libraries fund.

Proposed stage 1 works include:

- library refurbishment
- new outdoor space connected to the library
- refurbishment of Harold Box Hall to support more flexible use of space
- new kiosk/kitchen and reception areas
- connecting foyer and external deck area to support future integration of the two buildings
- relocation of Maternal and Child Health service from Harold Box Hall to improved facilities in the Neighbourhood House building.

The Dingley Village Neighbourhood Centre has been working with the City of Kingston for eight years to bring our Neighbourhood Centre and the Harold Box Hall up to a level that meets the needs of our Village. Harold Box Hall



will eventually become the home of the Neighbourhood Centre adult programs sharing space with the Library to better utilise community assets and the existing Neighbourhood Centre building will become a children's services centre

While the overall population of Dingley Village has remained fairly static, 10,777 (2016 Census), the profile has changed slightly with more primary schoolers and seniors. The usage of the Neighbourhood Centre and Harold Box Hall are increasing and more multi use community spaces are needed to meet demand. The Harold Box Hall was built in 1964 and in the early 1970's a very active Dingley Village Community Association conducted a local survey and ran public meetings in the hall to find out what further needs the local community had. One major outcome was a proposal to the then Springvale Council to build a Community Centre which did received

Council support and in 1977 building of the current Neighbourhood Centre was completed.

Over 1500 people a week use the complex and facilities provide for a wide range of groups and activities such as childcare, senior citizens, playgroup, CWA, Lions club, computer classes, exercise groups, arts and crafts. In addition, health and disability services utilise rooms to provide support services within the community and local residents regularly

access facilities for family functions. Dingley Village needs and deserves this redevelopment, which is going to bring the Library, Hall, and Centre together in a modern integrated way, which will make the whole complex more welcoming and accessible whilst maintaining and embracing its beautiful parkland setting

The Dingley Village Neighbourhood Centre will be working closely with City of Kingston in this exciting project and both City of Kingston and the Neighbourhood Centre want to hear from you, the community.

Draft plans and a video "walk through" of Stage 1 have been developed by the architects for the Council and will be made available for the public to view, comment and ask questions on the 17th March at the Dingley Village Farmers' Market. Council officers and representatives of the Neighbourhood Centre will available from 10am – 1pm

VILLAGE REFLECTIONS

This item appeared in a local newspaper circa 1954-1955



Dingley- a growing suburb between Dandenong and Cheltenham- went into action today.

And by the end of the year, Dingley hopes to have the finest recreation reserve around Melbourne. The people are building it for themselves.

About 40 menfolk, with the help of 20 tractors and one bulldozer began work on the reserve today.

By tonight, they hope to have levelled the ground for the reserve. The £400 pound they will save by doing it themselves will go to the cost of the pavilion. All of today's working bee except one are market gardeners. The other is the headmaster of Dingley State School Mr. A. (Gus) Schmidt. Whilst he directed operations from a homemade theodolite, the tractors and scoops levelled the area for a football ground.

Mr Schmidt is the treasurer of the Dingley Recreation Reserve Committee, which was formed a year ago. The committee raised £900 pounds to build the reserve on 14 ½ acres of land bought for the purpose by the Dandenong Council. The Springvale and Noble Park Shire



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Engineer, Mr Gordon Wright drew up the plans and the men promised to do the rest themselves.

The committee president Mr Joe Souter made a theodolite out of "odds and ends" which included a car piston, a sight from an army signalling lamp and three pennies.

Mr Souter expects the football oval, with surrounding cycle and athletics track and fence to be finished by the end of the year. "As soon as we have our own ground, we'll be able to have a Dingley football team" he said.

A basketball court, bowling green, dressing rooms and community hall are also planned for the reserve.

After today's working bee, the workers will attend a local dance tonight.

A women's auxiliary committee provided the workers with morning and afternoon tea and lunch from a caravan.

Dingley has a population of about 500, a general store and a schoolhouse.

SAVE KINGSWOOD GOLF COURSE

NO NET BENEFIT FOR DINGLEY VILLAGE RESIDENTS SAY NO TO REZONING, SAY NO TO SUBDIVISION

Dear Dingley Village resident,

SOON it is time for you to tell Council how you feel about the loss of Kingswood golf course open space and the proposed massive housing overdevelopment.

After a long process, Kingston Council is finally applying to the Minister for Planning to prepare a planning scheme amendment (C151) regarding the developer's request to change the existing Kingswood golf course zoning from "special use recreational" to "residential" and to permit more than 800 building blocks, some blocks are less than 200 square metres in size! (read 3-4 storey units)

Submissions (objections) must be lodged once the formal exhibition period has started and before the exhibition period ends.

The Council will send a notification letter to all owners and occupiers in Dingley Village, notifying them of the proposed Planning Scheme Amendment and will provide the date by which submissions must to be lodged.

What can you do?

When you receive the Council letter, send in your objection

If a large number of residents of Dingley Village say NO, the Council will withdraw the request and ask the Minister NOT to approve any change.

If we all object, we can stop this disaster ruining the quality of life in our unique

Don't leave it up to your neighbour or the people down the street to lodge an objection. Tell your friends & neighbours to be sure to object.

YOUR objection is vital, as it is all about numbers (e.g. 890 residents managed to stop the overdevelopment of the Mentone Hotel site). If you don't object now, don't complain when our Village is turned into a traffic snarled, high rise Ghetto!!!

This will be our FINAL chance to have a say in stopping this damaging project.

A sample objection letter will be included in the April Dossier issue. Please sign and post to Kingston council or leave in the collection boxes at the Neighbourhood Centre, 31B Marcus Rd., Dingley Village or Michael Benjamin's law office 117 Centre Dandenong Rd, Dingley Village.

Please photocopy the letter or collect spare copies from the Community centre or M. Benjamin's office, if you need more. Everyone over 18 years can object.

It is not in anyone's interest (except the developer) for this proposal to proceed.

Planning decisions should be about improving our lives NOT about making them more difficult and stressful.

NEW STREETLIGHTS HELP **CUT GREENHOUSE GAS AND** ENERGY COSTS

Kingston Council is cutting greenhouse gas and reducing the burden of rising electricity bills by installing over 7,500 street lights with energy-efficient LED globes.

Kingston Mayor Steve Staikos said Councils \$2.9 million investments on the new lights was leading the way in reducing greenhouse emissions and reducing the burden of increasing energy costs on ratepayers.

This initiative will replace the majority of Kingston's street lights with energyefficient lighting that will save energy and drastically reduce our impact on the environment. Cr Staikos said.

By reducing the money spent on energy bills for lighting the city, Council will be able to redirect savings to other important projects to improve services for our residents.

The new lights will:

- save 55,000 tonnes of greenhouse gas emissions over 20 years - equivalent to removing over
- 600 cars from the road each year
- pay for themselves in the next 6 years,
- after which savings can be directed into services
- improve safety and light levels in our local streets
- reduce light pollution and glare.

The rollout of energy-efficient LEDs in Kingston will begin in coming weeks and is expected to be completed by July.

KINGSTON COUNCIL CALLS FOR STRONGER **ENFORCEMENT OF ODOUR-GENERATING WASTE INDUSTRY**

Kingston Council is calling for stronger monitoring and enforcement of waste industry operators to ensure Clarinda residents are not subjected to foul odours.

Kingston Mayor Steve Staikos said that the local community had raised concerns about odours in the area over many years.

I am keen to see positive action taken on this issue and will make it a key priority of my Mayoral term. Cr Staikos said.

I've written to the EPA calling for this issue to be treated as a top priority with increased inspections to ensure waste operators are meeting their obligations.

Late last year Kingston Council issued a Planning Contravention Notice against operators of the Victory Road site regarding stockpiling of green waste material that we believe was resulting in odour issues in the area.

While Council can play a role, the responsibility for odour lies with the EPA and their expert staff are well-placed to identify odour sources and ensure compliance is achieved. Cr Staikos said.

We look forward to continuing to work closely with the EPA during the final stages of the waste industry in Kingston to ensure that issues of community concern are addressed and that the waste industry acts in accordance with the law.

Sadly, the Dingoes crashed down to earth in the next game at home against Cranbourne with an outright loss at Chadwick.

Our Seventh XI has seen some Dingoes make their debut in senior cricket. With their first game of the year cancelled against St Brigids/St Louis, their first game of the year saw Coomoora comprehensively outplay the Dingoes at 'home' (Keysborough College's Heatherhill Campus) before rebounding with their first victory of the season against Lynbrook, thanks to a sensational 4/8 by captain Kevin Matthews.

Our Women's XI currently sit on an even keel with four wins and four losses. Their first game after the New Year hiatus couldn't have gone much better with the Dingoes thrashing Gruyere District by 136 runs, thanks to half centuries to Nikki Shaw and Sharon Sheals along with a strong bowling performance, led by Shaw and youngster Leiha May with 2 wickets apiece. They then played Monash University, and despite another Shaw half century along with Emily Parks chipping in with 61 not out, they fell by nine wickets to Monash University.

We currently have multiple junior teams playing in the South Eastern Cricket Association along with an Under 13 girls team playing games midweek in the All Girls Cricket Competition (AGCC). Special mention to our Under 14A team, who are currently on top of the ladder.

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SCIATICA, BACK RELATED **LEG PAIN**

Leg pain, associated with back pain or without any symptoms of back pain is a reasonably common condition. The pain can range from a relatively minor inconvenience to quite a debilitating condition that is often treated poorly. Generally, early diagnosis and education about the dos and do nots will settle the symptoms before a back management program can be started.

Most leg pain symptoms are caused by injury to the nerves that exit the spine and run down the leg. This can be due to a variety of different injuries including:

- 1. Joint Injuries stiffness or pinching of joint
- 2. Disc Injuries disc inflammation or bulging
- 3. Muscular Injuries muscle spasms or strains

Often the episode of leg pain is preceded by a seemingly minor movement, such as bending over to pick up an object off the floor or twisting awkwardly whilst bending or lifting

The typical symptoms in the leg range from sharp shooting pain in the leg from the buttock to the back or front of the leg and even as far as the foot to constant nagging pain like toothache which does not subside with changing positions. Pain can be associated with pins and needles, numbness and weakness. It can be in the form of twitching, strange sensations in the leg such as increased sensitivity or acute tenderness in one region. The pain is often made worse by sitting, bending, coughing or sneezing, and is generally eased by lying down particularly on the asymptomatic side.

It is important to establish the correct diagnosis and begin some treatment, which will initially consist of some rest initially with anti-inflammatory medica-

tion and analgesia for those with constant pain. It is important to ensure that your treatment is individualized and that you seek treatment early to enable you are able to gradually return to your normal activities. As your symptoms settle, a thorough rehabilitation program including strength exercises are incorporated to reduce this risk of further exacerbation.

SHAREHOLDER AGREEMENTS

Have you started a business venture with another person and are looking to incorporate or are part of an ongoing business with other parties as shareholders in a company?

What you should seriously consider is a shareholders agreement.

Clarity:

A shareholder agreement is always a good idea because it clarifies what and how you and your business partner are to deal with each other, the business and with third parties. Hence, it is best to have this done prior to commencing business / incorporation, as there is a chance that once up and running or further down the track, parties recollection of details will differ if not contradict raising the possibility of disharmony and disputes.

Where you don't have a shareholder agreement and are a part of an ongoing business, it is not too late to consider a shareholder agreement.

Having a shareholder agreement in place ensures that all shareholders understand the company's scope and purpose, how the relationship of the parties are governed with regards to each other, the company and third parties and how the business and the parties will deal with issues and events.

What ifs

A well written shareholders agreement specifies the shareholders' intentions in relation to multiple "what if" scenarios such as:

- 1. What happens if one shareholder wants to leave the venture?
- 2. How will the shares be valued at the time of sale?
- 3. Will all shareholders have access to books and records?
- 4. Will there be any restrictions on sale to third parties? Who can be a share-holder in the venture?
- 5. What happens when one shareholder dies, becomes disabled or files for personal bankruptcy?
- 6. Assuming the shareholders are also employees of the venture, what are the duties of each party in relation to the venture? Roles and expectations?

- 7. What happens if there are unequal contribution between the shareholders?
- 8. Do the shareholders have an obligation to keep each other informed of something that happens outside the ordinary course of business?

Resolving disagreements

By agreeing to the terms and conditions, a shareholder agreement sets out rules and parameters about events and issues that may arise. Although you and your business partner may appear (or think) you are on good terms now, in business there are many unforeseen events and scope for disagreements especially for disagreements to snowball into significant disputes.

Where this happens, having a shareholder agreement should provide a framework/mechanism to resolve issues which could potentially save the relationship or allow orderly exit of one or more parties from the relationship. Conversely, where third parties seek to join the business, a well drafted shareholder agreement should provide mechanisms for incoming parties.

In extreme cases of shareholder disputes, the parties will likely incur significant legal fees or end up in court which are well drafted shareholder agreement can head off or curtail.

Better to be safe than sorry

It is important to note that shareholder agreements are, or at least should be,

company-specific. There is no 'one-size fit all' approach as the position and nature of relationship between shareholders are different in every situation. Your shareholder agreement should depend entirely on the specific circumstances of your venture.

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WHAT IS MYOPIA AND A **BEHAVIOURAL OPTOMETRY APPROACH**

Myopia or short-sightedness is when objects in the distance are blurry without corrective lenses. There are multiple reasons for developing myopia including genetics, ethnicity, environment, visual hygiene, and stress on the visual system. Research from the Brian Holden Vision Institute reports, the incidence of myopia is rising globally and will become one of the leading causes of blindness worldwide. Myopia creates a higher risk for glaucoma and retinal detachments.

Based on current trends globally, almost half of the world's population is predicted to be myopic by 2050 and our environment and working habits have much to do with this. Biologically our eyes have evolved to see clearly in the distance but we also buffer to handle near visual demands. Our eves work best in a 3D visual world where there is constant visual movement to flex and relax the eye muscles.

Prolonged near work on 2D surfaces, restricts this movement and can exhaust the near buffer. An adaptation has to occur to cope with these new demands. Myopia is this adaptation.

At this point you may make a visit to your optometrist with concerns about your blurry distance vision. A traditional approach would be to have single vision distance lenses prescribed. These lenses however, only mask the problem and can start the endless cycle of myopia progression. Steven Gallop, a well-known behavioural optometrist in America, calls this the sponge effect. The eyes soak up more and more minus power as more is



given, like a dry sponge soaks water.

A behavioural optometry approach for myopia treatment can involve a combination of therapeutic lenses, vision therapy or ortho-keratology lenses. Therapeutic lenses can be single vision near or a digital lens to reduce the visual stress for near tasks. Vision therapy is a sequence of activities to improve the awareness and control of the visual process. It involves re-wiring the brain in how information from the eyes is processed. Ortho-keratology is a hard contact lens worn while you sleep. This is one of the most recent advances in myopia control. It works by flattening the central cornea allowing distance clarity while also raising the peripheral cornea making near work easier.

Symptoms of over using our eyes include headaches, sore eyes, intermittent blur in the distance or near, getting double vision, low attention and tiring quickly after reading for short periods. Good visual hygiene like taking regular breaks between computer work, varying our visual experiences, spending more time outdoors can help reduce the demands on your eyes. If you are in school or have an office-based job, anti-fatigue lenses can be prescribed to help make near tasks easier and prevent the myopia from starting.
