Once again the Dingley Village Neighbourhood Centre has delivered boxes of donated toiletries to the Dandenong Neighbourhood House Refugee/Asylum seeker group and by the time you read this, those



toiletries will have been made up into packs and be in the hands of those affected by the floods in Queensland. The Refugee/ Asylum seekers group make up toiletry and hygiene packs from donations and these are then given to those in need including, the homeless, women and children in shelters and temporary housing and victims of disasters. Sharon facilitator of the group thanked the community of Dingley Village for all their donations of toiletries and that the project was important to the Refugee/Asylum seeker group as they feel they are making a contribution and giving something back in response to kindness shown to them.

How can you help? The Neighbourhood Centre is asking that you keep those toiletries supplied when you stay in a hotel (you have already paid for them in your room fee) and drop them off at the Centre. They also accept donations of any toiletries, not just those from hotels.

COUNCIL PURCHASES TWO PROPERTIES TO HELP GIVE KINGSTON'S GREEN WEDGE A BRIGHT FUTURE

Kingston Council has bought two key properties in Kingston's Green Wedge to ensure they are kept for the community to enjoy for decades to come.

Mayor Georgina Oxley said Council has purchased two properties at 52 and 60 Victory Road, Clarinda for a combined price of \$2.6 million.

"When the two properties came on the market Council jumped at the opportunity as they are in a key location neighbouring the future Victory Road Park," Cr Oxley said.

"The site next door will soon be transformed from a waste site into a fantastic new public park, so it made sense to buy these properties to give us options for the future."

The 31ha Victory Road Park will become a significant regional park within Kingston's Green Wedge and a key link in Council's long-planned Chain of Parks project.

The Chain of Parks will provide a pathway, linking parks through the Green Wedge from Karkarook Park to Braeside Park and will include a number of open spaces, including the Victory Road Park and the new park being constructed by Council on Elder Street South.

For full details of my privacy solicy, please refer to our website. Cr Oxley said the recently purchased properties could potentially be used for parkland, sporting fields or market gardens.

The sites, which total 3.02ha, have been bought using the Green Wedge Fund, which Council has established to fund investments that help bring to life Council's Green Wedge Plan, which includes the Chain of Parks project.

Cr Oxley said the purchase is part of a major transformation underway in the Green Wedge with Kingston finally seeing the end of the waste industry in our community, with former landfills now being turned into parklands and open space. "Council's Chain of Parks plan is now actually being implemented."

"The area was once home to over 30 active landfill sites, which are thankfully almost all gone. In recent years we're proud to have opened the new Spring Road Reserve, another link in Council's Chain of Parks plan."

"By purchasing these two properties Kingston Council is taking yet another step to ensuring a bright future for Kingston's Green Wedge for the community to enjoy."

"Council is also looking forward to working closely with the Victorian Government, which promised during the recent election campaign to invest in Kingston Council's Chain of Parks trail."

COMMUNITY GRANTS PROVIDE THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS TO SUPPORT LOCAL GROUPS

Kingston's 2019–2020 grants program is now open, with thousands of dollars on offer to help local community groups, artists and children's organisations build a stronger, healthier and socially connected Kingston.

Community members have until midnight on Sunday 31 March, to apply for one of three grants categories.

Mayor Cr Georgina Oxley said that having three grant categories provides applicants with more opportunities to seek out help, depending on each situation.

These categories include: Annual Grants – up to \$10,000

Not-for-profit community groups and organisations can apply for grants, for activities that contribute to the social, economic and health & wellbeing of the residents of Kingston.

Arts Grants - up to \$5,000

Individual artists, not-for-profit art groups and organisations can apply across three categories: arts projects; community arts projects; and mentorships & residencies

Children's Week Grants – up to \$1,000

Please do not leave anything outside and around the Hub bins as you can be fined up to \$6,340 for littering. If you see anyone doing this, you can report this to the EPA - free call 1300 378 842.

HOW ONE GIFT HELPED TACKLE BOWEL CANCER



It all started with a gift in a Will. The Hynam family wanted to do something to reduce the impact of cancer, so they left a sizable donation to Cancer Council Victoria.

This generous family wanted their legacy to help future generations.

Cancer Council Victoria used this money to launch its first-ever mass media bowel cancer prevention campaign, which urged eligible Victorians to participate in the National Bowel Screening Program Test when they received the free test kit in the mail.

Australia has one of the highest rates of bowel cancer in the world. Around one in 23 Australians will develop bowel cancer during their lifetime.

If detected early, 90% of bowel cancers can be successfully treated. Yet tragically, the test is ignored by 59% of the population. Bowel cancer

still claims the lives of around 4,000 Australians each year.

The 2017 campaign resulted in about 12,500 additional Victorians taking the test. It's estimated that this prevented about 200 cancer cases and saved approximately 120 lives.

This success prompted Cancer Council Victoria to run the campaign again last year, this time with the help of donors.

Seeing Cancer Council's ad on TV prompted Louise to take the bowel screening test - a test that would eventually save her life.

"I'd actually lost my test. When I saw the ad on TV I thought I better order one just in case. I had stage 3 cancer. The doctor said had I not done the bowel screen, I would have been organising palliative care at Christmas," – Louise, bowel cancer survivor.

The success of the 2017 and 2018 Do the test – it will save your life campaign was not to be ignored.

What started off with a gift in a Will, will now help people all around Australia.

Last month, the Australian Federal Government announced that it will provide Cancer Council with \$10 million so that we can continue the vital work that the Hynam family helped start.

Currently only 4 out of 10 eligible Australians participate in the National Bowel Screening Program. If we can increase this figure to just 6 in 10, around 84,000 lives can be saved in the next 20 years.

Thanks to the generous Hynam family and Cancer Council Victoria donors. Their support brings us closer to a cancer free future, and that's truly wonderful.

WHY DOES MY NECK HURT?

Why is neck pain so common these days?

How is it that so many people develop neck symptoms? It's not as if we have all sustained a whiplash injury, or all had some sort of traumatic neck damage in the past. So how can this be? What is it that so many people are doing wrong?

Let's consider the design of the spine for a moment: The spine was designed to be able to bend forwards and backwards in equal amounts. Remember this idea - it is equipped to move in both directions.

Forgetting the spine; let's do a little experiment: Take your index finger and bend it backwards as far as you can, so that you can feel the joint stretching. Now hold it there. How do you imagine your finger would feel if you held it in this position for several hours straight? It would start to hurt!

This is because the ligaments and muscles across the front of the joint are gradually being overstretched. This may not feel painful initially, but after an extended period, the tissues are overcome by the constant tension; and start to "give in". It's a bit like what happens to a slinky if you stretch it out for too long: it loses its springiness and strength.

The same is true of the spine. If we spend too much time bending the spine



in one particular direction (e.g. too much slouching forwards), we create an imbalance in which there is too much tension across our backs; and we start to get the same sort of pain described above. In this scenario, extra strain will be created by any activities in which the chin is bent down towards the chest (e.g. lying on our backs with too many pillows under our heads; or reading a book/newspaper that we are holding in our laps); or in which the chin is "poking" forwards (e.g. sitting at a computer or in a driver's seat and sticking the head forwards towards the computer / windscreen).

Unfortunately, in the modern lifestyle, most of us tend to slouch forwards more than they are aware, despite our best intentions. Because all of our daily activities are done in front of us, the natural tendency is to allow the shoulders and neck to fall forwards to bring ourselves closer to the tasks which we are completing. This is actually a postural fault which can lead to the sort of neck pain described above.

This is why our mothers all used to tell us to sit up straight and keep our shoulders back – trust me, they were right!!

However, it is very, very difficult to maintain a perfect posture for the entire day. So how do we fix this problem? This comes back to the idea that the spine was designed to be able to bend forwards and backwards in equal amounts. This means that as long as we interrupt our postures with regular stretches in the opposite direction, there will be no chance for the extra unwanted tension to build up in the ligaments and tissues which normally get sore.

If you suffer from neck pain, try the following stretches:

- Sit up as tall as you can and "tuck your chin in", almost as if you are trying to give yourself a double chin. Don't nod your head forward as you do this keep your head fully upright and simply draw it backwards as far as you can.
- Roll your shoulders backwards and downwards (not forwards); and pinch your shoulder blades together while you do this.

Try breaking up your daily activity by doing each of these stretches (about 5 brief stretches in a row) every couple of hours at least. You may find the stretches a little uncomfortable at first, but you may also find that you feel much looser after a brief period of trying them regularly.

At the same time, be sure to sit up as straight as you can and avoid slouching forwards – (which would undo all your good work!)

If you do have persistent neck pain, this can be treated by your local physiotherapist. Treatment may consist of massage, joint mobilizations, postural exercises, and strengthening exercises. Should you have any concerns regarding pain with in neck, particularly if you have had it for longer than normal, please feel free to contact your health care professional.

HOW THE FAMILY HOME CAN AFFECT AGED CARE FEES

Residential aged care is playing an increasing role in helping many older Australians enjoy comfortable and carefree lives. However, one of the tasks for anyone assisting an elderly relative with the move into aged care is to investigate the various fees and charges, some of which are subject to both assets and income means tests. As the family home is often the largest asset and can be a source of income if rented out, it's particularly important to understand how it is treated in relation to these tests¹.

Assets test

For individuals entering aged care the value of the family home is not counted as an asset if it is occupied by:

- a partner or dependent children,
- a carer who is eligible for government income support and who has been living there for at least two years, or
- a close relative who is eligible for income support and has been living there for at least five years.

However, even if that is not the case, the value of the family home that is counted as an asset is capped at \$166,707 (as at 20 September 2018). If the actual value is less than the cap then market value applies.

For a couple where neither partner is living in the family home, half of the net market value of the home will be included as an asset for each of them, up to the cap.

Income test

For people who entered aged care between 1 July 2014 and 31 December 2015, rent on the family home is exempt from the income test only if they are paying some level of daily accommodation payment.

Where aged care commenced after 1 January 2016, net rental income is assessable.

Split by health

Eric, 85, and Wendy, 87, own a home valued at \$650,000. In June 2018 poor health made it necessary for Eric to move into aged care. Wendy remained in the family home so the house was exempt from the assets test, and as there was no rental income, there was no impact on the income test.

Reunited

In November 2018 Wendy's increasing frailty also saw her entering residential care, fortunately in the same facility as Eric. Their former home was rented out and became assessable as an asset. As the value of the home is more than twice the current cap, they each have \$166,707 included in their assessed assets. Under the income test, half the net rental income is applied to each of their assessments.

Expert help

Aged care is a complex area requiring important decisions to be made at a time of high emotional stress. 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A LOOK AT MYOPIA

In Australia, about one third of the population is myopic (short-sighted), which is characterised by blurry distance vision. This is predicted to increase dramatically, and by 2050, 20 million Australians will be myopic.

Myopia has genetic, behavioural, and environmental factors associated with its progression, with more and more children being diagnosed.

The benefits of a good night's sleep are well known, improving general mood and well-being. The quality of our sleep is controlled by our circadian rhythms – an internal clock that runs 24 hours a day. These regulate almost all of our internal body processes, including our hormones, blood pressure, and heart rate. Researchers in Adelaide have now found that circadian rhythms may also contribute to our eye growth, and the development of myopia.

Circadian rhythms are controlled by our genes, in response to the amount of environmental light we are exposed to. Inside the retina (the back of the eye), there are special light sensitive cells that relay environmental information to the brain so we can process what is around us in both bright and dark conditions. This information directs whether the eyeball needs to grow longer to bring things into focus.

Research in animal models has shown that by changing the length of time that



your eyes are exposed to light, has drastic effects on the growth of your eyes.

The evolution of screen based tasks (TV, computers, tablets and smartphones), the artificial lighting that these devices emit, coupled with their prolonged usage, affects an individual's circadian rhythm. Studies have shown that myopes are more susceptible to these changes.

One study revealed that myopic subjects had higher levels of melatonin (the hormone released by the body to regulate sleep patterns), which is released at inappropriate times, meaning these subjects had poor or delayed sleep, compared to the non-myopic subjects participating in the study.

Ideally, it is best to avoid using our phones or tablets prior to sleeping, to ensure a decent night's rest. However for short-sighted people, it seems to be much more than a good night's sleep, but about maintaining good vision as well.

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3 YEARS TO LIVE

I have just been given 3 years to live.

It came as a shock – you try to live a good life, you do the right thing. Sure there is always a scare mongerer who will talk about what should be done different, but life rewards flow justly, right?

Not always it seems. Competition, small business: Once again the easy target.

Home loan mortgage broking began life as a marketing model. A method by which lenders without branches can market to the mass population and compete directly with the "name brands" and established branch networks.

For lenders such as ING, Citibank, or ME Bank (3 of many) having a cheaper interest rate and a better product is not enough. Potential customers firstly need to know your loan product exists. Then secondly need to have the confidence to use it. Reading an advertisement does not suffice, a face-to-face discussion proved to be the ideal communication and education device.

This new industry birthed in the 1980's removed barriers to new lenders, increasing competition and leading to a direct decrease in interest rates paid by every Australian as mainstream lenders were forced to compete.

Over time the infant industry evolved. Mortgage Brokers found that by increasing their own education and knowledge they could advise their clients on credit related issues over and above basic lender product queries, hence adding value to the transaction.

Concurrently more lenders recognised the advantage of using brokers as a distribution channel, and as the choice of lenders available through brokers grew, they began to be seen as a potential 'one stop shop'. In time the major banks joined their products to the broker offering. The industry matured.

However with this growth came great responsibility. The broker was no longer just a salesman, but a credit advisor. Hence industry regulation. In 2019 a broker needs a tertiary qualification, to operate under an ASIC licence subject to annual review, to have indemnity insurance, to be a member of an industry association, registered with the ombudsman, aligned with an aggregator, and undergo annual education and training requirements.

The industry has indeed evolved to such an extent that brokers are now seen as credit advice experts. Bank branch staff, to whom none of the above listed minimum standard requirements apply, are experts in the knowledge of their own bank's products but are not credit advisors.

59.1% of home loans are now lodged through the mortgage broker channel. With surveys indicating a 96% satisfaction level amongst those clients, broker share continues to grow.

So it is that the industry has been shocked to have been the primary bullseye target of the Banking Royal Commission. An enquiry into banking bad practice, highlighted by the fees-forno-service scandal (including charging dead people) has now recommended to ban service-for-no-fees!

With every industry there will be dodgy players. Tough rules and regulations to deal with those miscreants are essential. We are fortunate in Australia that the significant regulatory environment placed on this industry has minimised such issues.

There is in fact no evidence of systemic problems specific to the broker channel. Separation of powers between broker (giving credit advice) and lender (power to approve or decline a loan application) is in replication of government and legal best practice.

How the broker is paid (upfront and trail commission from the bank approving the loan) has the potential to be a problem if left unregulated. However alternative payment methods have proven to be more problematic. Current payments are fully disclosed, and the fact remains consumers have easy free choice to use or not use the broker channel as they see fit. Continued growth of confidence in and use of the broker channel is evidence consumers do not have a problem with the existing model. The Banking Royal Commission has recommended the current payment model be scrapped, to be replaced with consumers paying an upfront fee, the size of which is undetermined but could be from \$2,000 to \$5,000.

With the affordability crisis debate in full swing does anyone really think it is a good idea to add this to the cost of buying a home?

Other than the major banks of course, who had a major share price rally on the back of the thought of increased profits available following a wipe out of the broker industry. Any thought banks would pass on potential reduced costs via lowering interest rates ignores history, in Australia and overseas.

The Netherlands was held up as an example of a working 'fee for service' model. Since that model was introduced in 2008 the total number of banks there have decreased from 99 to 44, the five largest banks now control 83.8% of the market, and net interest margins have increased. That change has only benefited the major banks, unlike Australia where increased competition in the sector since brokers commenced operating has shown major benefit to consumers.

A majority of Dingley Village residents will have had an association with a Mortgage Broker in the past, or expect to in the future, perhaps yourself, or your children. At this time the industry has been given a 3-year life sentence. That would directly decrease competition between banks, increasing interest rates, causing increased property costs, rent expenses and living costs.

If you support competition in the banking channel, please add your voice to the call to our politicians to save the broker industry. Messages of support for a continuation of the current (working) model are important if you wish to have the service available to you when you next buy a home or require a refinance. There is a 'save the broker industry' petition you can sign at change.org, or contact us for further information.

I thank Dingley Village residents for your support and confirm death is not imminent, we will be here for at least another 3 years. With your support perhaps much longer.

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BECOMING A GUARANTOR

Have you been asked to become a guarantor?

Will it help someone you know purchase an asset or in business?

Often this will not be an issue but sometimes it can be a risky move for you if things were to take a turn for the worse.

Things to consider before becoming a guarantor

Borrowers usually need a guarantor as they may have a poor credit history, potentially may have issues making repayments or it is the policy of lending institutions/ credit providers seeking better security. A guarantor is there to use their own, assets, real property (especially the equity therein) as security for the lender. A guarantor lowers the risk of lapsing repayments and assumes the responsibility that if the borrower was to not make payments, the guarantor will.

In essence, the guarantor "guarantees" that a loan will be repaid one way or another.

As a guarantor, you should ensure that you are protecting yourself. Ensure you do some research and due diligence in the loan and borrower before signing. Is the borrower responsible?

Will the borrower make their repayments on time and of the correct amount? Why does the borrower require a guarantor in the first place?

- often partners or relatives simply overlook asking these basic questions on account of their relationship. This is not good practice. In any case, you must be willing to repay the loan, interest and recovery costs if the borrower fails repay the loan.

Lastly, what will you list as security if the guarantee is limited?

Remember, it is likely that what you are listing as security, may be repossessed in the future if the borrower does not repay the debt. Where you are providing a general guarantee you need to mindful ALL your assets will be at risk.

How to protect yourself?

1. At the very least read the guarantee document! Get independent legal advice on it.

2. With business related guarantees, proceed with extra caution.

3. There are other options that do not require you to become a guarantor. It is not the only way you can assist family and friends. An option is to give a one-off gift which may assist in covering a deposit or reducing the loan amount. This will reduce your ongoing responsibility and the risks associated with becoming a guarantor.

4. Ensure that the amount of money you are guaranteeing is capped and is not an unlimited amount. In case of a default, you are only responsible for up to the capped amount, and nothing in excess of that.

5. Become aware of what you are specifically guaranteeing. An 'All Obligation Guarantee' means you are guaranteeing all personal loans/credit card debts etc... not just the loan you thought you were signing up for.

6. The lender is obliged to provide you with all relevant documentation so that you know what the obligations of the borrower are. This importantly includes, but is not limited to, factors such as the circumstances which will result in you becoming responsible for the loan and how long your obligation as guarantor will last.

7. Consider whether you can remove yourself as a guarantor. Whilst you

are still obligated to the original guaranteed loan amount, you will not be responsible for additional debt which may be incurred after you have cancelled. There are many different guarantees and each have a different way of becoming removed. For example, removing yourself as a guarantor to a home loan, you and the borrower can apply to the lender to release yourself from your obligations and remove the guarantee once the equity in the home reaches 20%.

8. Obtain written agreement from the borrower requiring the borrower to keep you informed of their financial position.

9. Keep up to date with your insurance, in case of the worst possible scenarios.

It is also important to note financial institutions usually do not have to pursue the borrower for the debt first. Where the borrower has previous defaults, the bank can pursue you first instead. Further, financial institutions do not have to pursue all guarantors equally. Further, financial institutions usually have discretions over which assets they pursue to discharge a loan.

Guarantees are complex legal arrangements that usually put you and your assets at the mercy of third parties and events beyond your control. As such proceed with extreme caution.
