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LOOKING AFTER YOUR MENTAL HEALTH & WELLBEING

Everyone experiences stress or feels anxious at time, it is part of life, but it is how we deal with stress or the level of stress in our lives that causes problems.

When we first entered this pandemic earlier this year we were hopeful. The situation we found ourselves in was a little surreal, but most of us were optimistic it would end quickly. There was even talk about a vaccine by September! So we (mostly) did all the things we were meant to do and got on with life.

Down the track we now have large numbers of active cases and deaths occurring in a second wave and we're realising just how insidious and grim this virus is.

This is all being played out in the 24/7 media cycle. It's exhausting, it's stressful and we're scared and angry. It's no wonder many of us are feeling the impact on our mental health.

Both the State and Federal Governments acknowledge that mental health is a priority during these times and are allocating funds for support and resources. Many existing organisations focused on mental health and wellbeing are providing support specifically around the impacts of COVID-19.

Many of the things that contributed to our positive mental health such as spending time with close friends and family, working, hobbies, sport, volunteering and experiencing new things are not possible under restrictions.

Here are things you can do to take care of your mental health and wellbeing.

Look after your physical health

Exercising and eating well help us stay physically and mentally healthy.

Getting a good night's sleep is a really important part of staying healthy.



Stay connected

Maintaining social connections is important to feeling safe and well.

You can still keep in touch with family and friends while you practise physical distancing through: video chats, phone calls, online groups, chats with neighbours while keeping 1.5 metres apart

Develop new routines

We're used to having routines to guide our days and give us a sense of achievement. When so much seems out of our control, establishing some structure in our days will help to provide stability and a 'new normal'.

This is particularly challenging for families adjusting to home learning. Try to create new routines as a family to help separate 'work and school time' and 'family time'.

Think about the parts of your usual routine you value the most and find ways to make these part of your day — such as having lunch

with colleagues via video chat, or finding an online gym class.

Take breaks

Be kind to yourself and take time just for you, even if it is just a few minutes to take some deep breaths and step outside into the fresh air.

Plan your breaks and use them to do something that makes you feel calm and happy.

Reach out to others

Some people are particularly vulnerable for different reasons. They may be older, live on their own, have a chronic medical condition, or live in a challenging home situation.

Reaching out to give people support, if you are able, can help your mental wellbeing and make a big difference to someone else's life.

Seek support

It's normal to have ups and downs, and it is important to talk about how you're feeling with family and friends. In times like these, they are likely experiencing similar feelings.

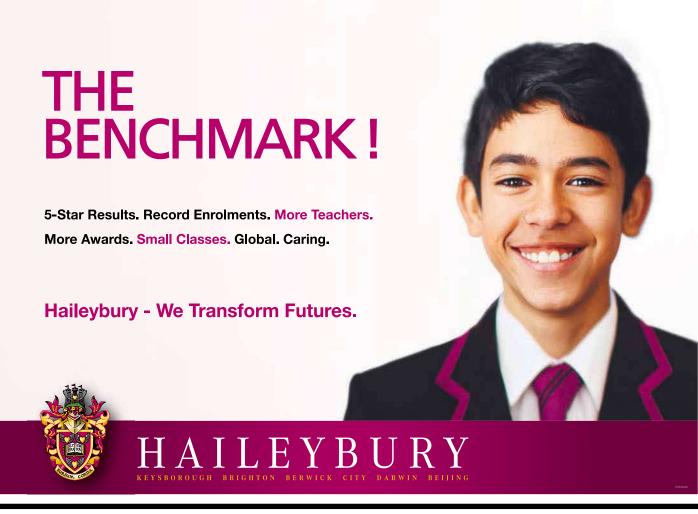

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I COUNCIL STUDY

DRAFT NEIGHBOURHOOD CHARACTER & HOUSING STUDY – CITY OF KINGSTON

Council has voted to make sweeping changes to the Housing Strategy & Neighbourhood Character Study, based on feedback from the local community.

Kingston Mayor Georgina Oxley said Council had listened to the extensive feedback it had received from the community on the proposed Housing Strategy and had made significant changes based on that.

"The local community told us they wanted less development and wanted to ensure dwellings over two-storeys were kept to a minimum in Kingston", said Cr Oxley.

Under the proposal, Dingley Village would become a Neighbourhood Residential Zone and its current neighbourhood character, heritage, environmental and/or landscape characteristics would be maintained.

In addition, the draft Housing Strategy identifies areas for substantial, transitional, incremental and limited housing growth. Dingley Village is identified as an area of Limited change and anticipated to accommodate the slowest rate of housing change.



What does this mean for Dingley Village

- 9 metre height zone, meaning no 3 4 storey development
- No more than two units on an averagesize lot (proportionally more on larger lots)
- Requiring any development reflects existing streetscape and setbacks

Council will now submit the revised proposal to the Minister for Planning to

consider the request to authorise the formal Planning Scheme Amendment, and the next stage of consultation. The Minister for Planning or his Department will make the final decision on what goes out for consultation.

Council expects to open consultation towards the end of the year or in early 2021. All residents will be notified by post.

The Victorian Government estimates that the population of Greater Melbourne will grow to 7.9 million people by 2051 and has set out how all local Councils must accommodate growth.

"It's incredibly important we get the balance right as it affects everyone who lives in Kingston", said Cr Oxley. "For that reason, we have been consulting with the community throughout this process".

To meet demand, Kingston Council is planning to accommodate our share of population growth generally in and around key activity centres, close to public transport, shops and services. This would allow us to protect the neighbourhood character and amenity of our quieter residential streets.



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FARMERS' MARKE

Cheltenham Police attend each market, not only to check measures in place but to also chat and reassure residents, talk to stallholders and pick up delicious food and treats.



Whether you buy from one, two, ten or all of our vendors, the fact that you come along and support our stallholders is the main thing. Thank you to Vindy for sharing a picture of your August market haul and supporting the market. Many of

Whilst our stall holders are small businesses, the market is run on cost recovery. It does not operate to raise funds, but to provide a service to customers and vendors. we will continue to operate as long as restrictions allow and stall holders want to attend. Everyone's safety is the priority.

KINGSTON TO TAKE ACTION ON GRAFFITI ACROSS THE CITY

Free graffiti removal kits, education for young people, the fast removal of undesirable graffiti and supporting public and street art are some of the ways Council will manage graffiti in Kingston under its new Graffiti Action Plan 2020-2025. With the help of the community, Council has developed an updated plan that seeks to find better, more innovative ways to manage graffiti across the municipality and build on its already strong reputation in this space.

Kingston Mayor Georgina Oxley said the community wants Council to be proactive in finding new ways to manage the issue of graffiti in their neighbourhoods and that's why we have developed a new action plan.

"We recognise that unwanted graffiti and tagging can create social and economic problems in the City of Kingston", Cr Oxley said. "We want to work with the community to remove undesirable graffiti quickly".

Young people and graffiti artists were part of the consultation and helped shape the Action Plan thanks to funding from the Victorian Government's Graffiti Prevention Grants Program.

Part of the plan is finding appropriate locations to facilitate murals by street artists and expanding Public Art projects across the city.

"We want to encourage and support quality, progressive and varied public art across Kingston including artworks by street artists", said Cr Oxley. Council will also work closely with police to support the investigation and prosecution of graffiti offenders.

Key actions include:

- Removal of obscene or offensive graffiti within 24 hours of it being reported to Council
- Supporting the provision of quality, progressive and varied public art into the urban landscape.
- Working to educate young people's understanding of the value of public assets
- Promoting community reporting of graffiti to Victoria Police
- Providing free graffiti removal kits to the community to remove graffiti from their property
- Kingston's proactive approach to tackling graffiti has been recognised by other Victorian councils and they are now looking to Kingston as a leader as they shape their own graffiti management policies.

COUNCIL AWARDS MORE THAN \$1.6 MILLION IN GRANTS TO KINGSTON'S COMMUNITY GROUPS

Social welfare groups, schools, theatres and sporting clubs across the municipality will share in just over \$1.62 million to continue their great work thanks to Kingston's annual community grants.

Kingston Mayor Georgina Oxley said Council was delighted to assist local notfor-profit groups deliver a wide range of services, programs and special events to the community.

"The need in the community has been greater than ever this year due to COVID-19 and our Community Grants program is all about supporting our local not-for-profit groups and organisations in delivering social welfare services, opportunities and activities for all residents in Kingston", said Cr Oxley.

A total of 183 grants have been allocated this year, among those were a record number of social welfare groups providing emergency relief measures and food hampers to the many in the community struggling to make ends meet.

"There are so many fantastic community groups doing great work across Kingston, Council is proud to be able to support their efforts", Cr Oxley said.

The 2020-21 funding includes:

- \$1,171,189 for three-year Partnership Grants to long established key organisations that provide important social and welfare services to Kingston residents
- \$315,100 in Annual Grants of up to \$10,000 for not-for-profit community groups to help develop a healthy, active and socially connected community
- The 2020-21 Community Grants Program attracted 75 Partnership and 120 Annual grant applications.

The grants include:

- \$489,153 to support local neighbourhood houses and community centres
- \$392,482 to support community social welfare organisations
- \$82,079 to support local multicultural and seniors' groups
- \$74,663 for sporting clubs and scout groups

Kingston Council's Community Grants Program also includes Individual Development Grants, Student Achievement Grants, Arts Grants, and Children's Week Grants.

At the AGM DVCA members acknowledged the outstanding service provided by our past Chairperson and Secretary David Madill over many years. David is a dedicated community advocate and tireless worker for Dingley Village, helping to make our village the great place we all live in.

Acknowledgement and thanks were also made to our North Ward Councillors for their continued support of the DVCA over the past year, especially the contribution made by Cr Staikos. Cr Staikos has attended DVCA meetings, provided numerous progress reports on Council activities and contributed constructive and thoughtful input on many issues to the DVCA and our community.

YEAR IN REVIEW - DVCA

Whilst progress is often frustratingly slow, particularly in this "year of Covid-19", positive things do happen.

Spring Road Reserve

Council continues development of the old Springvale tip as our community park. The latest park improvement being installation of a new skateboard facility.

DVCA has worked with Council to form a "Friends of Spring Rd Park" group to progress plantings, signage and maintenance, to ensure our new park is for the enjoyment of all residents.

· Chain of Parks

Council is currently preparing trail plans (walking & cycling paths) for the Chain of Parks. The finalised trail plans will recommend future actions for the provision of trail paths linking the chain of Parks from Karkarook Park down to Braeside Park. This continues implementation of the Chain of Parks recommendations in the Council's Green Wedge Management Plan.

The Chain of Parks, first proposed in the 1970s, comprises the gradual redevelopment of former closed and remediated landfills within the Kingston Green Wedge zone into a series of linked recreational parks.

• Community Centre Redevelopment Stage one of our Community Centre redevelopment has been completed and now provides modern facilities for residents, including a new library. An excellent

New Centre Dandenong Road Pedestrian Crossing

DVCA is working with Council on the provision of an additional pedestrian crossing for Centre Dandenong Rd, east end of the shops. Approval for the new crossing has been given, with the crossing design now being prepared.

Chadwick Reserve

Refurbishment of the playing fields and pavilion at Chadwick Reserve is well under way, with all works scheduled for completion by December 2021.

• Dingley Reserve

Redevelopment of the Dingley Reserve has commenced with early plans being prepared, after community input.

Draft Neighbourhood Character & Housing Study - Kingston

Council recently supported the proposed Neighbourhood Character & Planning zoning rules for the whole of Dingley village to be placed in the 9 metre height zone, meaning no 3-storey development for Dingley Village. A very good result which reflected residents wishes.

FRIENDS OF BRAESIDE PARK

Stage 4 Covid restrictions have made Braeside Park more important to communities within its five-kilometre radius.

Citizens now know that Braeside Park has over 12 kilometres of tracks for walking, running, jogging, bikeriding, and pram-pushing. The Park's 312 hectares of environments include Red Gum forest, grasslands, heathlands and wetlands.

It is possible there to forget the surrounding suburbia and major road infrastructure, although the noise, light and dust from the building of the Mordialloc Freeway is becoming more and more difficult to ignore. This Vic. Government Major Roads Projects Victoria is detrimental to the only slice of bushland in south-east Melbourne.

Many people now know Braeside Park through their daily 1 hour of exercise, but I wonder how well they understand the value of the Park?

Braeside Park has a checkered post-European history: vegetable farming, horse training, sewerage treatment, and now urban parkland.

Pre-Europeans, the local Bunurong people lived there for many thousands of years using the wetlands for food and valuing its significance. It was re-named part of Carum Carum Swamp by Europeans for whom it was a "dark, dismal place" best drained, grazed, farmed and then subdivided.

Today, we are still "reclaiming" this land for human use. The isolation restrictions have seen some realise that open, indigenous spaces are more than just exercise tracks, playgrounds, picnic spots, mown grassed areas, and vegetable gardens. They are spaces for conserving and re-wilding Australia's unique plants and animals.

The benefit is not just uniting us as Australians, but recognising that we are custodians of the environment for the next generations. Spotting over 60 species of wetland birds, some of which travel from Japan (Latham's Snipe) or north-eastern Siberia (Sharp-tailed Sandpiper) each Summer, cannot be ignored. The Spring and Summer flowering of the native pea-bushes, bursarias, native orchids and the beautiful Wedding Bush are visual splendours.

We do not own nature, we are actually part of nature and we, like the Buronung people, draw on nature for succour in times of need - like this pandemic. History is full of the demise of civilisations that over-reached their natural resources' capacity. The State and Federal Governments plan to log, to mine, to drain, to sell and to build on all our nature for money. This is no real leadership to any future.

What has this to do with Braeside Park? Well, the Victorian State Government has written to invite the Friends of Braeside Park to make their submission to the Inquiry into Environmental Infrastructure for Growing Populations. The Inquiry Committee is interested in the views and insights of stakeholders.

Who knows whether this is a step forwards or backwards? Calling the natural world which makes the air that you breathe "environmental infrastructure" could mean that our authorities now take it as seriously as they do the billions of dollars which they spend on the freeways which no informed person thinks is a way to the future; or that 'clean coal' with all the credibility of 'solid air.' But, that depends on how well you think that we are governed? Left to themselves, do our governments give us the infrastructure we want or need, or shoddy expedients?

This Inquiry will have consequences also for the development of the former golf course in Dingley Village and the remaining Green Wedge. I would urge you to think about making a submission. The closing date for submissions is 28 September 2020. Submissions can be lodged by:

These crazy times make us all feel like we are in a movie, perhaps a futurist dystopian drama, or perhaps a little like JAWS 2, with COVID-19 replacing the shark.

"It seemed we had everything under control. For a time. But nature cannot so easily be controlled: Not only did the danger return, it is worse."

As in that movie we see our leaders needing to walk the tightrope, in a balancing act between safety and the economy. Each decision made is critical.

We also have our heroes fighting the foe. For the rest of us we must keep safe: Our isolation is our keeping out of the water.

It is in these times of isolation we need most of all to maintain motivation, to continue to focus on the moment, on our lives, providing support where we can to those around us, and caring for ourselves.

The 5 km current boundary restrictions force the support of local community. As a Dingley Village resident and an employer with a Dingley Village office I am a strong supporter of the Dingley Dossier "Shop Local" campaign. I hope you are too.

In the world of finance and real estate, interest rates are at record lows. Whilst many property owners are not currently in a position to refinance there are many who are. Now, if you know what you're worth, then go out and get what you're worth.

But you gotta be willing to take the hit, and not pointing fingers saying you ain't where you are because of him, or her, or anybody.

Cowards do that and that ain't you. You're better than that."

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COVID 19 AND YOUR HEALTH

Interviewed by Norman Swan on the ABC this week, Professor Grant McArthur of the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre has noted that there has been a 30% reduction in the reporting of cancers since the COVID 19 lockdown began in March. He said this equates to the delayed diagnosis of approximately 3000 cancers in Victoria over a 6 month period. This will mean that cancers will be presenting in a more advanced state making treatment more difficult.

This has been occurring as a result of patients not visiting their doctor to discuss their health and not undergoing routine tests such as blood tests, cervical screening tests, prostate exams and mammograms.

I would like to take this opportunity to advise the Dingley community that interHealth is operating as usual. All of the doctors at the medical centre are working their normal hours and are available for consultations. We are able to offer appointments for over the phone consultations which are ideal for non urgent matters such as repeat prescriptions and referrals. These appointments are available to any patient with a valid Medicare card. Prescriptions will be emailed to your pharmacy of choice for easy pick-up.

Face-to-face consultations will continue to be offered where it is necessary. Please call 9558 2155 to speak to our friendly reception staff who will arrange an appropriate appointment with your doctor.

EYES RIGHT

COSMETICS AND OCULAR HEALTH

Beauty is in the eye of the beholder. But many of us spend a tremendous amount of time and money trying to spruce up our looks, often by applying makeup. However, if makeup is not used appropriately near the eyes, it can lead to some pretty unpleasant consequences; including infection, allergic reactions or injury.

Developing an eye infection defeats the purpose of wearing makeup in the first place. After all, there's nothing pleasant about a puffy, red eye. You can avoid this by following some basic rules and applying common sense to your makeup routine. If cosmetics are used for longer than recommended, they can become contaminated with bacteria and fungi.

Cosmetics should be discarded and replaced according to manufacturer recommendations, usually every three months for mascara. Writing the purchase date on the packaging can help you keep track of the dates. Additionally, clean your brushes and other applicators regularly to remove pathogens. If you have had an eye infection, discard and replace all eye makeup to prevent reinfection.



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Sharing cosmetics, including the use of tester products in stores, is another potential avenue for introducing infection. One of the most common infections transmitted via makeup is conjunctivitis, which is inflammation of the membrane that covers the inner surface of the eyelid and the outer surface of the eye. Using disposable applicators may reduce the risk of transmission; however, bacteria and fungi may still be present in the cosmetic container if it is not wiped clean between uses. Proper storage can also contribute to product safety; temperatures below 30°C is recommended as the preservatives of products stored at higher temperatures are more likely to deteriorate. Finally, don't "top-off" dry mascara with water and don't use lip liners on your eyes.

Not all reactions to makeup are caused by infection, sometimes, allergies can be the culprit. Common allergens found in cosmetics include nickel, iron oxide and ingredients found in preservatives and fragrances. Be wary of the term "hypo-allergenic"; this label is no guarantee that the product is allergen-free. Try to introduce new cosmetic products one at a time to determine your sensitivity to specific components, especially if you are prone to allergies.

Be wary of applying makeup around the eyes, as this requires a steady hand. Mechanical injury to the eye can result in corneal abrasions, or worse, perforation. For this reason, you should never put on makeup in a moving vehicle, especially if you're the one driving! You can also avoid tempting fate by wearing makeup only

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on the distal (outside) lash margin—and never inside, where you might introduce bacteria to the ocular surface. Placing makeup along the inside of the lash margin also can block up your glands.

When you apply makeup before putting on contact lenses, some of the oils or bits of makeup can smudge or get stuck on the lens. For this reason, it's best to wash your hands, put in your contact lenses and then apply makeup as a final step. There is one exception to this process: If you wear hard or rigid contacts, insert them after makeup application, but use caution to avoid smearing the lens during the process.

Finally, whatever makeup you put on, needs to come off at bedtime. Depending on what type of makeup you use, ordinary soap and water may not do the trick—especially on mascara. When mascara dries, it gets stiff and can cause the natural eyelash to break, possibly leading to lid disease, ocular surface disease and contact lens intolerance. Simple precautions to maintain eye health while using cosmetics can help keep your eyes not only looking great, but also feeling and functioning at their best.

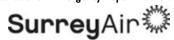
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CIRCLING THE CLUBS

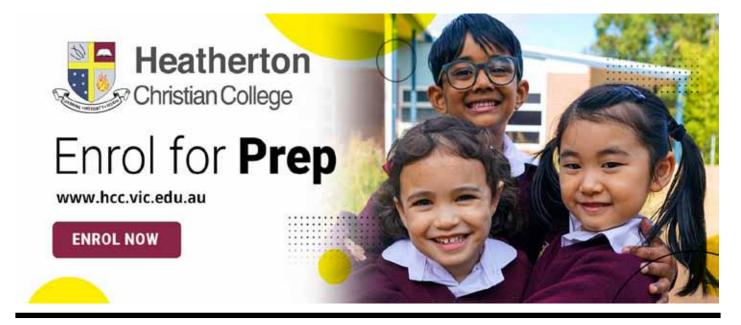
