A Remembrance Day Service will be held at Noble Park RSL at 11am on Saturday November 11 in the memorial park adjacent to the RSL, 1128 Heatherton Rd, Noble Park, for those wishing to attend.

Moorabbin Airport Residents Association Inc (MARA)

The purpose of MARA is to represent the interests of residents near flight paths in and out of Moorabbin Airport whose wellbeing and amenity is impacted by aircraft noise. It aims to improve liveability and safety for nearby residents and to achieve a significant decrease in the noise levels over residential areas.

The Moorabbin Airport Master Plan 2021 has received approval by the Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government in September 2023. MARA have been concerned about the lack of consultation with the local community, and especially residents in the area.

They are strongly concerned over the impact of noise and the failure to substantially attend to any concerns raised about the increase of aircraft noise over the years as the amount of aircrafts movements has increased. MARA made submission to the Master Plan review that aircraft noise is a negative environmental aspect, and every reasonable effort should be made to reduce its impact on affected communities.



Fate of Kingswood golf course

What has been announced?

The Minister for Planning has approved the rezoning of the former Kingswood Golf Course site to General Residential Zone, which is expected to support around 800 homes.

"This decision provides certainty for the proponent but more importantly, for the broader community about the future of this site." (ed.?????) The Minister did not approve the development plan that had been submitted by Aust Super.

Instead, the Proponent (new buyer), will need to prepare a new development plan, responding to key issues that have been identified by the independent Standing Advisory Committee.



That development plan will need to be approved by the Minister prior to any development occurring at the site. As part of the preparation of the development plan, the Minister for Planning will require further consultation to occur with the community, on the design of the proposed development before any further decisions are made.

What are the next steps?

Prior to any redevelopment, the Proponent must prepare a development plan in accordance with the new planning provisions, to the satisfaction of the Minister for Planning. The development plan must be prepared and approved before a planning permit can be granted for new use and development.

Given the interest in this site and the issues raised by the SAC, the Minister will require further consultation to occur with the community on the design of the proposed development before any further decisions are made.

Moorabbin Airport Master Plan

A revised masterplan for Moorabbin Airport has been Federally approved. The revised plan removes a controversial proposal for commercial warehouses, in land dedicated to aviation purpose, in the airport precinct.

The Dingley Village Community Association sees the plan as "a lose-lose for Dingley Village". It guarantees continued aviation growth with no new measures to reduce aircraft noise or number of movements.

The plan also still supports major development across the whole of the airport site, just not encroaching on current land assigned to aviation. This has to reduce overall safety for everyone, pilots, passengers, employees, shoppers and nearby residents. A significant "buffer zone" is needed for emergencies. Remember the Essendon /DFO crash, 'lucky' only pilot & passengers died.



New dog park opens at Chadwick Reserve

Pooch owners of the south-east rejoice! Chadwick Reserve in Dingley Village is now home to an all-new and improved off-leash dog park.

The old off-leash area has been transformed into a 3000 square metre enclosed doggie haven, with new agility equipment, a large run about area, nature play features, a stick library, and everything pet owners need to enjoy a great outing with their pups, including dog waste bag dispensers and plenty of shelter and seating.

In a first for Kingston, the park has a separate area for small dogs who might prefer to play with others their own size. Mayor Hadi Saab said the new park is the latest way Kingston is supporting our pet owners across the city.

"We are an animal loving Council and committed to ensuring we are providing the best possible spaces for our furry friends to safely exercise and socialise," Cr Saah said

The mayor said Chadwick Reserve is a great place to visit for non-dog owners too. "Council has invested heavily in the reserve over the past three years, to make it an inviting space for people of all ages to get active and spend time outdoors," Cr Saab said.

"We've done lots of planting to make it brighter, greener, and more welcoming, built a beautiful new pavilion, upgraded the basketball court and BMX track, and reconstructed the oval.

"A new barbecue, picnic table and shelter have been installed, and there is lots of seating and park benches throughout the reserve.

"The newly upgraded playground has been really popular with Kingston kids too, featuring all ages play equipment, including accessible swings and nature play elements.

Courage - By Bridgette Veneris

On Remembrance Day we gather to honor and pay tribute to the men and women who displayed immense courage to fight for us. The courage shown by these men and women is a testament to their selflessness, resilience, and unwavering spirit,



and is as an inspiration to us all. As we reflect on the profound acts of bravery displayed by those who have served our country, I think of the courage they displayed and how we too can demonstrate courage in our everyday lives.

All of us have had to display courage at some stage. Courage is the catalyst that helps us move forward, leaving these obstacles in our rear view. And I'm sure when faced with trying situations we have all found this difficult, found it hard to display courage in the face of adversity, because having courage is no simple task, it requires resilience, determination and motivation.

Courage is not limited to the battlefield but is displayed in the everyday acts of bravery that we often take for granted.

Courage is the ability to do something that frightens oneself; it's bravery. It's tough to have courage, hard to face your fears, as fears are what keep us human, what keeps us out of harm's way. If something frightens us, we will avoid it, avoid that panic and worry embedded in us ready to jump out when we approach that daunting obstacle, our fears warn us of its dangers. So, fears are formed to protect us. It becomes difficult however, as no matter how hard you try to avoid them you eventually come face to face with something that might scare you, whether that is a test for a class you are struggling in, a difficult situation at work, an argument with your friends or something much more difficult.

Eventually, fears become reality, and eventually we are going to have to face them and in doing so express bravery and courage. Having courage gives us the ability to overcome our fears and move forward in life rather than coming to a standstill when things get difficult.

Courage is a quality that resides within us all, regardless of age, gender, or background. It is the ability to face adversity, to persevere in the face of fear and uncertainty, and to stand up for what we believe in, even when the odds seem insurmountable. Having courage is like having a superpower, it acts as a shield from things that may seem frightening, it heightens our strength giving us the power to persevere even when things get tough.

When I was 8 years old, I was diagnosed with leukemia, I was told that If I hadn't gone to the hospital the night I had I would have died the next day, I was only 8, having a sleepover with my best friend the night I found out, and looking back on that time of my life I think of a frightened 8-year-old. I lost all my hair, a side effect from the medicine, my cheeks looked like chipmunk cheeks from all the steroids, and I was always tired from the drugs they were continuously pumping into me. The journey was hard, 2 and a half years of chemotherapy, steroids, pain and hospitals.

Every single day I wished I hadn't gotten leukemia. I wished I could be normal and play sport and dance and have hair and not be called a boy. But here I am standing here today in front of all of you with the opportunity to talk to you about courage, a trait I hold near to my heart, as without courage my agonizing 2 and a half year journey would have been that much harder. I displayed immense amounts of courage as I woke up each day with a smile on my face, I displayed courage when I made friends in the hospital, making the best out of a bad situation, I displayed courage when I went through something no child should ever go through. Courage is necessary for survival, necessary for overcoming fears and for moving forward in life, as without the courage I had during my cancer journey who knows where I would be today. Courage is not the absence of fear, but the ability to face it head-on. It was finding strength in the midst of weakness, and summoning the determination to keep going when things were hard. It was a daily choice to keep fighting, no matter how tough the battle seemed.

Courage is an admirable quality, one that is hard to have but necessary in order to grow and thrive in this world. We must honour those fallen soldiers, those who displayed immense amounts of courage and bravery by too displaying acts of courage every day. Smile at that stranger walking down the street, be vulnerable in a conversation with someone, just get out of bed and do a small activity for the day, these are small but mighty acts.

I know you have now heard about the importance of courage and how necessary it is for survival, it saved me in hospital. I now urge you all to do one courageous act a day and observe how much of a difference it really does make, and recognise and acknowledge courageous acts of others, Remembrance Day is about recognising the courageous acts of fallen soldiers and remembering their courage, I remember the courage I had to endure 2 and a half years of chemotherapy, I remember, bravery of all those kids in the hospital, I remember the courage those doctors had to continue researching and treating kids with cancer.

I remember and am grateful for the value of courage as without it who knows where any of us would be today.



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LOOKING AT LOANS

Buying Property With Friends

Interest rate increases have most likely peaked, drawing property purchasers back to the market. But many are left asking: "How can we possibly afford to get into this market?"

This is particularly the case with singles. Home loan prices are continually bid up by couples with 2 incomes. The tax benefit alone of a dual income family makes an enormous difference to the disposable income available to pay to a mortgage. Being a de facto or same sex couple is no hindrance at all – but being single is tough!

One creative way to overcome being locked out of the property market is to look at buying with a group of friends. It can also be a minefield though, so here are some hints on how to avoid an explosion which could destroy not just your wealth, but your friendships as well.

It will be an exciting time. You join in a life-changing moment which will put everyone on a bit of a high. But that is exactly when you need to plan for situations in which things might go wrong. It's essential you have all been completely upfront from the start about what you want to achieve by purchasing property together, as well as your personal expectations about timelines for purchasing the property, paying it off and selling it. And all of this must be documented in a coownership agreement.

You need to engage a solicitor or conveyancer with experience in working on co-ownership

agreements, who can advise and create yours and make sure it is suitable, providing the necessary legal protection for everyone involved. The big question will be what structure your ownership takes. There are two options: joint tenants and tenants in common. Joint tenancy is the most common ownership structure in Australia, as it is how most family homes would be owned. However, because friends are less likely to share assets and long-term debts than a couple, and less likely to will their assets to each other, the 'tenants in common' model would usually be more suitable for this situation.

Under this model, each person owns a specified share of the property's value. The purchase of each share can be with a varying combination of deposit and bank loan. These shares in the property may be equal, but do not need to be. So, if you are willing to contribute \$500,000 to the price of a property, but your two friends can only contribute \$250,000 each, you could own a 50% stake while they each own a 25% stake.

Keep in mind, each stake is in the property's value, not control of the property. Legally, under this model, each owner has the right to full access to the entire property.

The co-ownership agreement should set out how the costs of maintenance and insurances are divided, as well as how sale proceeds will be divided. It should also cover plans for depreciation and capital gains tax, choosing tenants or determining rent, selling a share of the property (otherwise there are no restrictions on this under the tenants in common model), and selling the property altogether. If all purchasers are planning to occupy the property, the agreement should

make plans for if one wants to move out but continue their ownership. Under the tenants in common co-ownership structure, the other owners would not be obligated to pay rent to the one who has moved out, as long as they are not restricting that co-owner's access to the property.

There are many more considerations when buying property jointly, so speak to us early on to make sure you're doing it the right way.

BARK FOR JOY! Church Recognised For Caring For All God's Creatures



Heatherton-Dingley Uniting Church has received two prestigious environmental awards for its climate and environmental action commitments, including its unique focus on ministry to dogs and their owners.

Rev. Deacon Andrea Mayes says, "For 10 years we have had a bi-monthly morning tea called Bark and Chat, which regularly raises money to help other animals through RSPCA. In 2023 we started a bi-monthly Dog Church service, where we think about how dogs can connect us with God and encourage us to care for the broader natural world."

She explained that the church, "has been on the journey to become environmentally friendly for a very long time. We installed a 4kW solar panel system and solar hot water in 2012. In 2021 we installed energy efficient lighting throughout our building.

In 2022 we applied for a grant through Sustainability Victoria's Community Climate Change and Energy Program to replace 4 old gas heaters in the church with two energy-efficient split system reverse cycle heaters/air conditioners. These were installed in early 2023. These larger actions have been accompanied by smaller actions such as only having our urn/hot water turned on when we are using it and making sure all appliances are turned off at the wall after use."

The church has also been holding regular eco-worship services on Sunday morning, with the highlight being Sunday, 30 June this year, when a special National Tree Day event was held and the broader community were invited to join the congregation for an

eco-service followed by tree planting and morning tea.

The Basic Certificate and Eco Worship Awards were presented to the church on behalf of the Five Leaf Eco-Awards by Geoff Serpell, a member of Leighmoor Uniting Church (who received their Five Leaf Eco-Awards Basic Certificate award in September).

He said, "It's wonderful to be able to celebrate with Heatherton-Dingley Uniting Church, share what we have done at Leighmoor, and build each other up so that both our communities can aim higher as we work towards the next awards in the program."

The Five Leaf Eco-Awards are an ecumenical environmental change initiative for Australian churches and religious organisations founded in 2008

to assist, inspire and reward churches for environmental action.

The Five Leaf Eco-Awards are noncompetitive, with churches completing tasks from a list of flexible criteria to earn each certificate. There are currently seven awards of varying difficulty available.

MEDICAL MATTERS

Lung Cancer

Lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths for both sexes and is responsible for almost one in five cancer deaths in Australia. It is estimated that more than 14,700 people were diagnosed with lung cancer in 2023. The average age at diagnosis is 72 years old.

What is lung cancer?

Lung cancer starts when abnormal cells grow and multiply in an uncontrolled way. Cancer that begins in the lungs is called primary lung cancer. If cancer begins in another part of the body and spreads to the lungs it is known as secondary or metastatic cancer in the lung.

What are the risk factors for lung cancer?

A risk factor is any factor that is associated with increasing someone's chances of developing a certain condition, such as cancer. Some risk factors are modifiable, such as lifestyle or environmental risk factors. Others cannot be modified, such as inherited factors and whether someone in the family has had cancer.

Having one or more risk factor does not mean that you will develop cancer. Many people have at least one risk factor but will never develop cancer, while others with cancer may have had no known risk factors. Even if a person with cancer has a risk factor, it is usually hard to know how much that risk factor contributed to the development of their disease.

Factors that are associated with a higher risk of developing lung cancer include the following:

Lifestyle factors

Current or former tobacco smoking - this is the greatest risk factor for lung cancer. The risk is greatest for people who begin smoking early in life, smoke for longer and smoke more often.

Environmental or occupational factors

- Exposure to second-hand smoke (passive smoking).
- Occupational exposures, such as exposure to radon, asbestos, diesel exhaust and silica. Exposure to asbestos also increases the risk of developing mesothelioma, which starts in the lining surrounding the lungs (the pleura).
- Exposure to air pollution.

Personal factors

- Increasing age.
- Family history of lung cancer.
- History of chronic lung disease, including chronic obstructive pulmonary disease and pulmonary fibrosis.
- Personal history of cancer, including lung cancer, and head and neck cancer.
- History of radiation therapy to the chest for other cancers.
- Infection with HIV (human immunodeficiency virus)
- Certain gene mutations.

If lung cancer is found at an earlier stage, there is more chance of a better outcome. It's important to know the symptoms of lung cancer as although lung cancer occurs mostly in people aged 60 and over, it can affect people of any age. New and constantly evolving treatments such as immunotherapy are likely to continue to improve outcomes for people affected by lung cancer.



What are the symptoms?

- coughing up blood
- a new or changed cough that doesn't go away
- chest pain and/or shoulder pain or discomfort the pain may be worse with coughing or deep breathing
- trouble breathing or shortness of breath
- hoarse voice
- weight loss
- loss of appetite
- chest infection that doesn't go away
- tiredness or weakness

Many conditions can cause these symptoms, not just lung cancer. Anyone can get lung cancer, even if they have never smoked. If you have any of these symptoms and they are persistent, talk to your doctor.



Meaningful Connections is Better Health Network's government-funded volunteer visiting program (formally the Community Visitors Scheme) that has been enhancing the health and wellbeing of senior Australians since 1992.

The program provides companionship to seniors who are experiencing loneliness and social isolation, through regular social visits. Volunteer visitors are matched with recipients, based on shared interests, to enable meaningful connections through conversation and activities such as board games, reading, reminiscing or outings.

Volunteers support seniors living in either private homes or aged care facilities, with visits taking place weekly or fortnightly. For recipients living in private homes with family, volunteers can also provide opportunities for carers to have valuable respite.

Keratoconus: Causes, Symptoms and Treatment Options

Keratoconus is a relatively rare eye condition that affects the cornea, the clear front surface of the eye. While it may not be as well-known as other eye conditions, such as cataracts or glaucoma, keratoconus can significantly impact a person's vision and quality of life.

What Is Keratoconus?

Keratoconus is a progressive eye disorder characterised by the thinning and bulging of the cornea into a cone-like shape. Normally, the cornea is shaped like a dome, helping to focus light into the eye and onto the retina. However, in individuals with keratoconus, the cornea becomes weak and starts to protrude outward, leading to distorted vision.

Causes of Keratoconus

While the exact cause of keratoconus is not fully understood, it is believed to be influenced by a combination of genetic, environmental, and hormonal factors. Some possible contributing factors include:

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
YOUTH CORNER

Wuthering Heights - Kate Bush

Out on the wily, windy moors.
We'd roll and fall in green.
You had a temper like my jealousy.
Too hot, too greedy.
How could you leave me.
When I needed to possess you?
I hated you. I loved you, too.

It was no secret that this song was influenced by the 1847 Emily Bronte novel of the same name. Bush read the book and discovered that she shared her birthday with Emily Bronte. She wrote the song aged eighteen in 1977 and it was released as the lead single from Bush's debut album 1978. Apparently, the record company were not keen that it was the lead, but Bush was determined and, in the end, got her way. It peaked at number one on the UK Singles Chart for four weeks. It also reached the top of the charts in Australia and several other countries throughout the World. Wuthering Heights received widespread acclaim and continues to be highly regarded to this day. A song about a famous British Novel - who would think of that being such a success.

At the time I thought I have to read the book. It was a difficult book to read and at times could be confusing and I am not sure that I finished it. It did help me to understand how Bush interpreted the story. The first lines of the song "Out on the wily, windy moors we'd roll and fall in green" In the video of the song Bush is shown dancing in a grassy area in Salisbury Plain. The name Wuthering Heights refers to the name of a haunted farmhouse in an exposed moorland location. In the story Bronte teaches you that everyone has a bad side. There are no virtuous characters in the book - all of them are capable

of good and evil, just like real people. "Wuthering Heights" is sung from the perspective of the two main characters Heathcliff and Catherine Earnshaw. Catherine dies and comes back as a ghost for Heathcliff's soul and breaks his window with her hands. She has come back so they can spend eternal life together. As in Bush's lyrics 'Heathcliff, it's me, I'm Cathy' I've come home, I'm so cold Let me in your window' Heathcliff, it's me, I'm Cathy'. Their love is bound for failure from the beginning, and she dies and haunts him until he joins her.

The song is hauntingly beautiful, it captures the atmosphere of the book, love and loss, passion and possession along with death in the Gothic setting of the bleak house upon the wily windy moors.

Literature has always played a role in Bush's creativity. At one stage she was creating a song called "The Sensual World" inspired by Molly Bloom's speech towards the end in Ulysses by James Joyce. The Joyce Estate refused her the rights to use the work. However, many years later the Joyce Estate changed their mind and granted her license. She reworked the song and called it "Flower of the Mountain". The copyright is due to run out on Ulysses very soon.

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
