AUSTRALIANSUPER ABANDONS PLANS TO RE-ZONE AND DEVELOP KINGSWOOD GOLF CLUB SITE AND PUTS IT UP FOR SALE

The nation's biggest super fund, AustralianSuper, bought the Kingswood Golf Course site in 2014 for \$100 million with plans to rezone and develop the existing 53Ha golf course into 800+ 1,2 & 3 storey dwellings.

In 2018 AustralianSuper applied for rezoning, to the City of Kingston, resulting in over 8,000 objections to the application. The City of Kingston voted not to support the proposed planning scheme amendment and AustralianSuper withdrew its planning application.

In November 2020 AustralianSuper submitted a new proposal under the state government's Planning Guidelines for the Conversion of Golf Course Land to Other Purposes in Victoria. On g May 2021, the Minister for Planning referred the proposal to the Golf Course Redevelopment Standing Advisory Committee (Advisory Committee) for consideration and advice.

The Advisory Committee was to consider and advise the Minister if the proposal satisfied the Planning Guidelines for the Conversion of Golf Course Land to Other Purposes and was consistent with state and local policy.

In March 2022, the advisory committee's report was handed to the Minister of Planning, who requested additional information from the committee and the report has not been made public.

In a media release on the 1st of September 2023 AustralianSuper announced that it had commenced an Expression of Interest (EOI) process to divest the former Kingswood Golf Course site.

A spokesperson for AustralianSuper said the sale was the result of a review by the fund of its property portfolio.

"Our decision to divest has nothing to do with the rezoning application," the spokesperson said. "Regardless of any decision on this application, we would be divesting this asset at this time. It is simply too small and no longer aligns to our property investment strategy."

What now for the site?

Whilst the sale is a major victory for those opposed to the development, the future of the site is still in limbo. The City of Kingston has continued to oppose AustralianSuper's planned development.

"The site is not needed to provide housing supply, as Kingston already has a positive plan in place to meet our housing supply needs right through to at least 2038, without needing to valuable green open space provided by golf courses," Kingston Mayor Hadi Saab said. "These sites provide valuable tree canopy and reduce heat islands in our suburbs, which are increasing with growing development and climate change."

As both the City of Kingston and the majority of the community of Dingley Village oppose residential redevelopment of the site, any sale of the land will be closely watched.

How AustralianSuper market the sale will be of particular interest, if, as suspected, as a residential development subject to approval. Any potential buyer will be made well aware of the opposition AustralianSuper has experienced by those fighting the development.

Save Kingswood, Dingley Village Community Association and local residents have campaigned tirelessly to stop the overdevelopment and 20% increase in population of Dingley Village with the resultant impact on the villages' green space, infrastructure and village character.

They have continued to monitor the site to protect the green space and the local wildlife from inappropriate tree removals.



DVCA was pleased to have Michael Galea, our State Parliament Member for South Eastern Metropolitan Region, attend our monthly DVCA meeting in September.

Mr Galea spoke to DVCA members on a number of local issues in our village, including Kingswood Golf Course, the Kingston Planning Amendment C203, Hawthorn Football Club development and transport / road safety issues.

Kingswood Golf Course - For Sale

Australian Super has announced it is selling the Kingswood Golf Course, following a review of its investment strategy for the super fund's property portfolio.

Background

- Australian Super bought Kingswood Golf Course in 2014, without zoning for residential development.
- Australian Super sought to rezone and develop Kingswood for a large medium to high density 3 storey housing development. Our community, supported by our local politicians, worked long and hard to stop this inappropriate development, resulting in Council abandoning the proposed rezoning of Kingswood in October 2018, following a record number of objections, approximately 8000 objections.
- Australian Super submitted a second rezoning and development proposal to the State Planning Minister in November 2020, which was reviewed by the newly created State Government's Golf Course Redevelopment Standing Advisory Committee, who submitted their report to the Planning Minister in April 2022.

The State of Play Now

The Planning Minister, who is responsible for deciding the outcome of this second rezoning and development proposal, has yet to make the final decision. The proposal is still under consideration, and it is believed that flood mitigation issues are unresolved.

 Kingswood remains zoned 'Special Use Golf Course', which allows the land to be used as a golf course and residential development cannot occur.

Kingswood Golf Course - The Way Forward

- Now that Kingswood is being re-sold, Council is calling for the Planning Minister and Australian Super to abandon the Kingswood development proposal and so enable potential new owners to start a genuine engagement with the community on Kingswood's future - DVCA fully supports this.
- Australian Super continue to support their rezoning and development proposal for Kingswood, stating in their recent Kingswood Sale Announcement it would provide increased housing diversity and community and social infrastructure that will benefit the local community.

This sounds good, but the reality is that the proposed development does not provide any additional sports facilities, medical, education or other community infrastructure to Dingley Village and would significantly reduce local amenity in our village.

In his recent letter to the AGE Newspaper on future housing provision in Kingston and the Kingswood Golf Course, the Mayor of Kingston states.

Golf course sale leaves residential zone plan mired in the rough

"Cutting down dozens of trees to build 800-plus homes on the former Kingswood Golf Course site is being framed by many as urgently needed to meet our housing crisis.

But this simply isn't true – there's plenty of better options for housing available right now that don't sacrifice our green, open spaces and impact the climate. Of course, we urgently need more housing stock. Kingston understands it needs to take its fair share of new development and we have developed a plan to meet housing needs through to at least 2038. This plan is awaiting the minister for planning's approval.

We can save our green spaces to help our climate and deliver much-needed housing close to train stations and activity centres.

There are plenty of suitable sites ready and waiting – including at the Victorian Government's Gas Works site (Highett) and Level Crossing Removal Project (Cheltenham), not to mention the huge amount of growth expected in the future connected to the Suburban Rail Loop. Kingswood is not one of these though.

We simply don't need to lose golf course land to achieve this. Once these sites are gone, they are gone forever, and any changes must be carefully considered."



Sale of former Kingswood golf course presents ideal opportunity to reconsider its future

(This statement can be attributed to Mayor Hadi Saab):

Kingston Council hopes a potential sale of the former Kingswood golf course site to new owners will be a chance to reset the relationship with the community and offer genuine engagement on the site's future. Current owner Australian Super has announced it intends to sell, nine years after purchasing the site and seeking permission to rezone and develop the land. The proposed development sparked over 8000 community objections, was opposed by Kingston Council and is currently awaiting a decision from the Victorian Planning Minister. We made very clear to the Advisory Committee we have serious concerns about the current proposed development and that it should not go

Kingston is calling on the Minister for Planning and Australian Super to abandon the application to ensure any new owners can start fresh with the community. Given the potential change of owners, this is an ideal time to start a genuine process to engage with the community on the future of the site.

The Victorian Government's guidelines for converting golf courses for other uses has a strong focus on engagement and the Dingley Village community is keen to play a part in the future of their suburb. The site is not needed to provide housing supply, as Kingston already has a positive plan in place to meet our housing supply needs right through to at least 2038, without needing to develop valuable green open space provided by golf courses.

These sites provide valuable tree canopy and reduce heat islands in our suburbs, that are increasing with growing development and climate change.

The federal government is about to release a climate risk report to look carefully at key sites like this, to make sure that climate change is a key factor in any decisions about their future. Once these sites are gone, they are gone forever, and any changes should be carefully considered. Any prospective buyer should be aware that the vast majority of the land is not zoned to allow for residential development as it is in a Golf Course Zone.

Future of aviation at Moorabbin Airport hangs in the balance

The future of Moorabbin Airport is on a knife edge with aviation businesses kept in the dark and fearing for their survival. Aviation businesses celebrated when a proposed 5-year Masterplan for the site was refused by former Deputy Prime Minister Barnaby Joyce in 2022 due to growing concerns that aviation businesses were being pushed out in favour of factory developments.

These developments have progressively eroded aviation, despite it being the core purpose for the Commonwealth-owned land. The Moorabbin Airport Corporation was sent back to the drawing board but has argued current legislation does not require it to share any details on the updated plans for the site with aviation businesses, residents, or Kingston Council. Kingston Mayor Hadi Saab said it was utterly ridiculous that a Masterplan for a significant airport was not shown to neighbouring residents or tenants onsite particularly when it directly impacts their business survival or allows large warehouses against residents' boundaries.

Moorabbin Airport, located in Melbourne's south-east just 25km from the CBD, is Australia's second busiest airport averaging 295,000 movements per year and is responsible for the training of about 25% of Australia's pilots.

"The Federal Government is due to rule on the Masterplan at any time, yet neighbouring residents have no idea how their homes may be impacted and aviation businesses on the site have been left in the dark about their future," Cr Saab said. "This is clearly unfair. One of the reasons the first draft was refused was due to a lack of consultation. How can anyone say there has been consultation when key stakeholders have not been shown any new designs since the first draft was refused."

Council sought legal advice from one of Australia's top Kings Counsels who has questioned the approach the Airport has taken and disagrees that further consultation is not required after the first draft. Moorabbin Airport Chamber of Commerce President Rob Simpson said the first draft of the Masterplan had large areas of the airport land currently used for aviation set aside for large industrial/commercial uses.

"Australia needs a strong aviation industry, but aviation businesses are being pushed out in favour of warehouses," Mr Simpson said. "There is a global pilot shortage and now is the perfect opportunity to boost strong pilot training services, but businesses have no certainty they will have any room at the airport." Kingston Council, aviation businesses and nearby residents have flagged concerns about growing factory development at the site for a number of years which would result in:

- Reducing space for aviation at the site and increasing safety risks.
- Long-standing aviation businesses that are reliant on being located on the airport may be forced to close.
- Neighbouring homes facing huge factories being over the fence, with no planning protections embedded in the Masterplan which require a Major Development Plan trigger to be used to ensure a robust and prescribed consultation on any such proposals.

 Loss of highly respected pilot training services which provide qualified, safe pilots for the industry.

"We are simply calling for development at Moorabbin Airport to be properly managed in a way that protects aviation at the site, respects neighbouring homes and does not increase safety risks at the site. Buildings should be located away from homes and should leave plenty of open space for emergency landings," Cr Saab said.

Cr Saab said Kingston Council and aviation businesses had taken their concerns directly to the Federal Infrastructure Minister Catherine King, who oversees the department that will provide advice on the Masterplan.

"We have been pleased to meet with Minister King twice to raise concerns and we hope that a Masterplan is not approved until proper consultation occurs and that the plan is safe, sets aside more space for existing and future aviation activities and includes buffer zones between warehouses and neighbouring homes."

Proper strategic planning requires that the site's primary purpose as an airport is prioritised.

"There is a strong history of refusing inappropriate airport development with Anthony Albanese previously refusing masterplans for both Bankstown (2011) and Canberra (2008) airports and blocking plans for inappropriate commercial development here at Moorabbin Airport (2013). An airport and the industries on it are not something you can easily replace," Cr Saab said.

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DYSLEXIA

Dyslexia

Dyslexia is not a disease! The word dyslexia comes from the Greek language and means difficulty with words.

Key facts

- · About 1 in 10 people have dyslexia.
- The brains of people with dyslexia work differently to people without dyslexia.
- Dyslexia symptoms can vary from quite mild to quite bad.
- People with dyslexia can be taught to read using a specific teaching strategy called systematic synthetic phonics.
- Coloured glasses and eye exercises don't help people with dyslexia.

Individuals with dyslexia have trouble with reading and spelling despite having the ability to learn. Individuals with dyslexia can learn, they just learn in a different way. Often these individuals, who have talented and productive minds, are said to have a language learning difference.

Dyslexia occurs on a continuum from mild to severe and no two are alike. There is no cure for dyslexia since it is a brain based difference, however with appropriate instruction aimed towards their learning needs, most can overcome their literacy difficulties and lead productive lives.

What are the symptoms of dyslexia?

Symptoms of dyslexia can vary from quite mild to quite bad. Pre-school aged children with dyslexia may have problems with:

- delayed speech.
- difficulty pronouncing some words.
- · learning the alphabet.
- · writing their name.

Primary school aged children may:


- have lots of errors when reading.
- · read slowly and without expression.
- · avoid reading especially aloud.
- struggle to understand what they've read
- have school anxiety.
- show signs of low self-esteem.

High school aged children may have:

- many of the same problems as primary aged children.
- a reduced vocabulary.
- Many people with dyslexia are very creative, or gifted in areas such as the arts, computing or sports.

What causes dyslexia?

Dyslexia often runs in families. A person with dyslexia often has a family member with dyslexia or other reading or spelling problems. We don't yet know which genes cause dyslexia.



Studies show that the brains of people with dyslexia work differently to people without dyslexia.

Dyslexia can lead to other problems than learning:

- Social problems. Left untreated, dyslexia may lead to low selfesteem, behaviour problems, anxiety, aggression, and withdrawal from friends, parents and teachers.
- Problems as adults. The inability to read and comprehend can prevent children from reaching their potential as they grow up. This can have negative long-term educational, social and economic impacts.

Children who have dyslexia are at increased risk of having attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), and vice versa. ADHD can cause difficulty keeping attention. It can also cause hyperactivity and impulsive behaviour, which can make dyslexia harder to treat.



Diagnosis

There's no single test that can diagnose dyslexia, and before seeking specialist support, you should talk with your child's teacher. They will help identify any areas of concern with your child's learning. You should also arrange to have your child's hearing and vision checked. This is to rule out problems with their hearing or eyesight. An educational psychologist usually diagnoses dyslexia.

The psychologist will:

- Take a history, covering medical, developmental, education and family aspects.
- Investigate your child's learning strengths and weaknesses.
- Consider what the teacher says, as well as test scores supplied by your child's school.
- See how your child has responded to academic intervention.

A child must get at least 6 months of special teaching to improve their reading skills before dyslexia is diagnosed.

How is dyslexia treated?

People with dyslexia can improve their reading and spelling skills. A child with dyslexia will benefit from being taught explicit and structured phonemic awareness and phonics (systematic, synthetic phonics). A child with dyslexia needs to practise their reading and spelling.

This might be by: Completing a systematic synthetic phonics intervention program. working with learning support teachers. working with an experienced tutor. working with a speech pathologist.Decodable readers also help children with dyslexia learn to read. These books introduce letter-sound knowledge. You should make sure that any intervention program you consider for your child is evidence-based. Check that independent reviews support its effectiveness — not reviews provided by the program manufacturer.



With the right intervention, most people with dyslexia will improve. However, this will take a lot of time and work targeting their specific area of weakness.

Appropriate adjustments

People with dyslexia can benefit from appropriate adjustments made at school or work. An adjustment is an action that allows you to take part in the same way as other people. At school this might look like:

- Using an audio book.
- Not reading aloud.
- Having extra time to finish tasks.
- · Not copying from the board.
- Use of assistive technology.

Adjustments are specific to the person and will change over time.

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THE VOICE REFERENDUM

Voting at the referendum, what do you need to know?

Australians will go to the polls on October 14 to vote in a referendum on an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice. We have not voted in a federal referendum since 1999. So, what do you need to know?

How is a referendum run?

A referendum is run by the Australian Electoral Commission in the same way as they do elections. That means most people will vote in a polling booth on Saturday October 14 at a local school or community centre. There will probably be a barbecue, with a democracy sausage or two, and a cake stall if you are lucky.

But there will also be pre-poll voting and postal voting, just like in an ordinary election. Voting in a referendum, like an election, is compulsory. One difference will be that there will only be one ballot paper, and it will be short and easy to fill out. So, the queues at polling booths should move quickly.

What will I be voting on?

A referendum is used to ask the Australian people whether they approve of a change being made to Commonwealth Constitution, which is Australia's ultimate law. In this case, the amendment doesn't change existing words, but instead adds new words to the Constitution. If passed, the amendment would insert a new Chapter IX at the end of the Constitution, saying:

Chapter IX — Recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples

129 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice

In recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the First Peoples of Australia:

(i) there shall be a body, to be called the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice;

(ii) the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice may make representations to the Parliament and the Executive Government of the Commonwealth on matters relating to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples;

(iii) the Parliament shall, subject to this Constitution, have power to make laws with respect to matters relating to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice, including its composition, functions, powers and procedures.

Despite the rather confusing public debate about other issues, all that voters are being asked to do in a referendum is decide whether or not the above words should be inserted in the Constitution.

What is the question and how do I fill in the ballot paper correctly?

The ballot paper does not contain the words of the amendment you will be voting on, as in many cases the amendment would be far too long. Instead, voters are asked to approve the amendment as set out in the proposed law that has been already passed by parliament. That proposed law is identified by its "long title", which gives a brief description of its nature. In this case, voters will be asked:

A Proposed Law: to alter the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice.

Do you approve this proposed alteration?

A single box is then provided, and you fill in your ballot paper by either writing "yes" or "no" in that box.

While there are some "savings provisions" that allow votes in other forms to be counted if the voter's intention is clear, it is best not to risk it. Just follow the directions and vote "yes" or "no" to ensure your vote counts. If you want to see a copy of the amendment when you are voting, you could bring with you the pamphlet outlining the "yes" and "no" cases that the Australian Electoral Commission is currently sending to each household. It sets out the amendment and the arguments either way.



Giving an informed vote is important.

The people who wrote the Constitution entrusted us with the final say about changes to Australia's most important law, in the expectation that we would perform our constitutional duty responsibly. We should not betray that trust.

How is the outcome of the referendum determined and when will we know?

All the votes given in polling booths will be counted by hand on the night, so the results should come in pretty quickly, as it is a single ballot paper with a simple "yes" or "no" choice. Pre-poll votes and those postal votes that have already been received will also be counted on the night. That means we should get a good idea of the result on the night, but if it is very close, we would have to wait some days until the rest of the postal votes arrive and are counted. All votes go through two counts to double-check results and the counting process can be watched by scrutineers.

Unlike an election, there is a special double majority that has to be met for a referendum to pass. First, a majority of formal votes across the country (including in the territories) would need to be "yes" votes. Second, there would have to be a majority of "yes" votes in at least four out of six states (for which territory votes do not count). This means, for example, that 60% of voters in the country could vote "yes", but the referendum could still fail if a majority of voters in three of the less populous states voted "no".

What happens if the referendum passes or fails?

If the referendum passes, it is then sent to the governor-general, who gives assent to it. Once that happens, the amendment to the Constitution is made. The amendment says, "there shall be a body, to be called the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice". But it also says legislation is needed to determine the composition of the Voice and how it operates. The next step would be consultation about such matters before legislation is enacted to give effect to the Voice.

If the referendum fails, no change to the Constitution is made.


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KEEP LEFT UNLESS OVERTAKING

Back to basics

Our society needs more long-term rental properties available for tenants. Are you able to assist?

Do you review your tax return when the accountant sends it to you for sign off? Some years ago, when I sent an investor client back to his accountant with a list of questions, there was an amended tax return subsequently submitted. It resulted in a tax refund of over \$10.000.

Buying the right property for investment purposes is critical. A major part of the decision-making process (all too often ignored) is cash flow. Assessment of cash flow needs to consider rent returns, property expenses, interest costs, depreciation, and tax effects.

You need to be able to afford to keep the property long term! For the benefit of the tenants and the investor. Compounding capital growth is achieved in long term ownership.

Correct structuring and continual review of your property, loans and finances is critical in ensuring long term sustainability of investment. This is where your broker comes in. 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

MEDICAL MATTERS

Breast Cancer



Key facts

- Breast cancer occurs when cells in the breast grow abnormally and form a tumour.
- Symptoms may include a lump in the breast, discharge from the nipple, and changes in the appearance or texture of the breast or nipple.
- Breast screening is a safe and helpful way to detect breast cancer early, especially in women aged 50 to 74.
- Treatment for breast cancer depends on which stage the cancer is at, and may include surgery, radiotherapy or chemotherapy.
- With prompt detection and treatment, 9 in 10 women with breast cancer survive at least 5 years, and many live much longer.

What is breast cancer?

Breast cancer is a disease where cells in the breast grow abnormally and in an uncontrolled way to form a lump, known as a tumour. If left untreated, lumps may spread from breast tissue to other parts of the body, such as the bones, liver or lungs. Breast cancer affects both men and women, although it is less common in men.

What are the symptoms of breast cancer?

Symptoms of breast cancer can include:

- a lump or area of thickened tissue in the breast (especially if only on one side).
- · a change in the size or shape of one or both breasts.
- a change in the shape or appearance of the nipple, such as crusting, sores, redness or inversion (where the nipple turns in instead of pointing out).
- changes to the skin of the breasts, such as dimpling (looking like an orange peel), rash, or redness.
- discomfort or swelling in either armpit.
- Symptoms of breast cancer in men are similar to those that women experience.

If you have any unusual symptoms, such as the above, you should see your doctor to get them checked.

What causes breast cancer?

While there is no specific cause for breast cancer, some lifestyle factors are associated with a higher risk of developing the condition:

- Drinking alcohol.
- Unhealthy weight.
- · Smoking.

Other factors that can't be changed also impact your likelihood of getting breast cancer:

- Your age The older you get, the more likely it is your cells become damaged and progress to cancer.
- Your family history Women with a first-degree relative with breast cancer are twice as likely to get it themselves than women without one.
- Having BRCA1, BRCA2 or other gene mutations.
- Dense breasts Women with more dense tissue in their breasts (visible only using an X-ray or mammogram) may have a higher risk of breast cancer.
- Previous radiation exposure Women who were exposed to radiation therapy in the chest region (for example, for childhood cancers) may have 5 times the risk of breast cancer as women who were not.

When should I see my doctor?

See your doctor or healthcare professional if you notice symptoms of possible breast cancer, such as a lump, pain, itch, nipple discharge or dimpling, or if you have any concerns about your breast cancer risk.



Can I be screened for breast cancer?

BreastScreen Australia offers a free screening program for women at risk of breast cancer:

- If you're aged between 50 and 74 years, you'll be invited to access a free mammograms every 2 years. This is because nearly 4 in 5 breast cancers occur in women aged over 50.
- If you're aged between 40 and 49 years or over 75 years, you are also eligible but won't be contacted about it.
- Women under 40 years of age are usually not offered breast screening because the density of their breast tissue makes it harder to detect cancers on mammograms.

Younger women with a strong family history of breast or ovarian cancer, or women with breast cancer diagnosed in the last 5 years may also benefit from breast screening. For more details, call BreastScreen Australia on 13 20 50 or visit their website.

How is breast cancer treated?

Depending on the features of the breast cancer, there are several treatment options.

Surgery

This treatment involves removing localised cancer from the breast. A lumpectomy ("breast conserving surgery") involves removing the cancer and some healthy tissue but keeping the breast intact. A mastectomy involves removing the whole breast affected by cancer. During breast surgery, lymph nodes under the arm may also be removed.

Radiation therapy

Radiotherapy is often used to destroy any breast cancer cells left following a lumpectomy or lymph node removal. It is sometimes used after a mastectomy if there is a risk of cancer recurring in the chest area.

Chemotherapy

Chemotherapy involves using anti-cancer drugs to kill the remaining cancer cells in the body. It may be used before or after surgery or radiation therapy, or together with radiation therapy.

Hormone therapy

Hormone therapy involves drugs that reduce your body's oestrogen and progesterone levels, to stop or slow hormone receptor positive cancer cells.

Palliative care

In some cases, the medical team will talk to a patient about palliative care. Palliative care aims to improve your quality of life by alleviating symptoms of cancer.

Colour Vision Deficiency

Colour vision deficiency or "colour blindness" is a common vision condition that affects roughly 500,000 Australians or approximately 2.5% of the population. Of this group, males are disproportionately represented, with 8% of men affected compared to 0.5% of women. The primary reason for this is the genetic nature of colour vision deficiency, as it is mostly an inherited condition passed down on the X chromosome from the affected patient's mother. Conversely, issues with colour vision can also be acquired or as a consequence of other ocular conditions such as stroke, diabetes or multiple sclerosis.

Colour vision is made possible by cone cells in the retina, which is a thin wall of tissue at the back of our eyes. The cone cells are sensitive to red, green or blue light, which they combine to give us the wide range of colours we normally see. If one or more of these cone cells is faulty, it affects the colours we perceive and results in a colour vision deficiency.

The most common type of colour vision deficiency makes it hard to tell the difference between red and green.

There are 4 types of red-green colour vision deficiency:

- Deuteranomaly is the most common type of red-green colour vision deficiency. It makes certain shades of green look more red. This type is mild and doesn't usually get in the way of normal activities.
- Protanomaly makes certain shades of red look more green and less bright.
 This type is mild and usually doesn't get in the way of normal activities.
- Protanopia and deuteranopia both make someone unable to tell the difference between red and green at all.

Blue-yellow colour vision deficiency makes it hard to tell the difference between several different colour combinations and is less common

There are 2 types of blue-yellow colour vision deficiency:

- Tritanomaly makes it hard to tell the difference between blue and green and between yellow and red.
- Tritanopia makes someone unable to tell the difference between blue and green, purple and red, and yellow and pink. It also makes colours look less bright.

If you have complete colour vision deficiency, you can't see colours at all. This is also called monochromacy or achromatopsia, and it's rare. Almost half of all colour blind people are unaware of their condition. This can create a number of problems, especially for children.

Many daily activities, such as choosing food, playing sports or reading involve colour. It's important to remember that 'Colour-blind' people still see colours, but certain colours appear washed out or are confused with other colours.

If you have difficulty distinguishing between blue and yellow, or red and green, have difficulty seeing light colours, or if you are frequently told by others that the colour you think you are seeing is wrong, it is important to book an appointment with your optometrist to get your colour vision assessed.

This can be tested with several different techniques, all of which are non-invasive and quick. These include Ishihara numberdot plates, Hue test or by using an Anomaloscope test.

Currently, there is no cure for colour "blindness". As colour vision deficiencies are usually inherited, if you are born with it it won't get any better, or worse. There are tools such as speciality glasses or contact lenses that can help enhance the difference between red and green colours to aid distinction but it is important to note these options have widely varying results depending on the type and extent of a person's colour vision deficiency.

Accessibility options have also become more commonplace in the past several years: for example, Playstation games such as Hogwarts Legacy (2023) has an option to skew the colour scheme to cater for protanopia, deuteranopia, and tritanopia.

SAVE KINGSWOOD GROUP

Save Kingswood's response to the announcement that Kingswood is for sale

After fighting and deceiving residents for nine years, AustralianSuper wants to make a big profit, leaving a new buyer to flood out Dingley Village and downstream Kingston. Who is going to buy houseboats for Social Housing? Or if by a shocking Government directive, dwellings were built, it's impossible to insure houses on a flood plain. Who can the residents sue, when they are flooded out?

AustralianSuper covered their mistakes, like not doing due diligence and not consulting residents and Council - by deceiving and fighting us. For example, by declaring in the Media "There will be no multi-storey buildings on Kingswood".

Fact: Their last plans had nearly 700 three storey units! They are so ashamed of their development; they still produce anonymous advertising and flyers. So much so, a recent anonymous flyer from them was declared fake by many residents. AustralianSuper is a \$274 billion company and could easily be good corporate citizens and recover their damaged brand, by selling Kingswood to Kingston Council for \$1.

Rezoning

Early in September 2023, a resident contacted our local member, Meng Heang Tak MP about reports on 3AW that Kingswood was rezoned. Heang said no, the Planning Minister was waiting for responses to questions asked by the panel. I suspect 3AW was "baited" by a stirrer or were just plain wrong.

Save Kingswood expects the main report requested will be Melbourne Water asking how AustralianSuper, in their wildest dreams, can control floods. Certainly, Melbourne Water said they were awaiting a response from about a

year ago. Thank you, Cr Hadi Saab, Mayor, City of Kingston for your support of Kingswood Golf Course. (ABC radio and AGE letters 7th Sept).

The people of Melbourne should not pick out one Golf Course as the answer to housing, before checking that it is suitable. There are 50 reasons why Kingswood should not be built on, including lack of infrastructure, loss of valuable green space, plus lack of public transport and services.

But there's one reason why Kingswood cannot be built on. Dingley Village has suffered floods from Kingswood for a very long time. But the floods that will come will be massively greater, if developers seal over.

Not seen any floods lately? It's a record dry, that as always in Australia, will break with a vengeance. Have they not learnt from disasters like the Maribyrnong River? Social housing that cannot be above water and is uninsurable is not the answer, especially when Kingston has provided plans for the number of houses demanded by the government until at least 2038.

Besides, government is forcing 200, three storey units on Dingley Village near the shops.

The developer underestimated over 100 million litres of floods for just one 25mm precipitation of 1 to 7 days. Their knowledge of the floods, including from the Kingswood retarding basin is so woeful, at first, they denied floods. Then - cornered by my research document - and numerous photographs, they said "we will build an \$18 million dam!".

Not good enough. When that mega dam also fills - and it will - the downstream pipes are not large enough, so more of Kingston will flood as well. Nature cannot be fought in a Flood Plain.

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
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
